SUMMARY ENROLLMENT REPORT UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII, SPRING 1997

This report presents information on total enrollment at the University of Hawai'i. Enrollment counts are given for each campus and include both regular credit and continuing education programs. Full-time equivalent (FTE) numbers are also provided by campus for the credit enrollment. Historical data are provided for the period from Spring 1987 to Spring 1997.

REPORTING METHODOLOGY

Enrollment counts in regular credit programs are unduplicated headcounts within each campus. Aggregate counts for the University of Hawai'i are duplicated only to the extent that a given student may be enrolled at more than one campus. However, with the exception of credit and CCECS non-credit courses at UH Mānoa and credit courses at Honolulu CC, continuing education enrollment counts are registration (i.e. duplicated) counts; a given student is counted each time he / she enrolls in a course. Although generally lower, unduplicated counts are preferred and are used whenever available. Therefore, the tables show a mixing of unduplicated headcounts and duplicated registration counts.

The numbers shown in this report are suggestive of overall enrollment activity at the campuses of the University of Hawai'i. While reporting for regular credit programs has been well-standardized for all UH campuses, reporting for continuing education programs has not. Since the tables in this report mix these two very different kinds of numbers, the reader is advised to exercise caution in drawing conclusions based solely upon the data shown in this report.

HIGHLIGHTS

Total enrollment at the University of Hawai'i reached 97,663 for Spring 1997, up (9.6%) over Spring 1996. The largest increases were at UH Mānoa (up 24%), Kaua'i CC (up 23%) and Hawai'i CC (up 22%). Leeward CC, Maui CC and Windward CC also registered increases over Spring 1996 (Table 3). All other campuses experienced declines, the largest being the Employment Training Center (down 22%), Kapi'olani CC (down 14%) and UH-West O'ahu (down 14%). Due to the nature of continuing education reporting, however, the reader is advised to compare these figures with those given for regular students in Table 3 of the *Spring Enrollment Report* for the *University of Hawai'i, Spring 1997*.

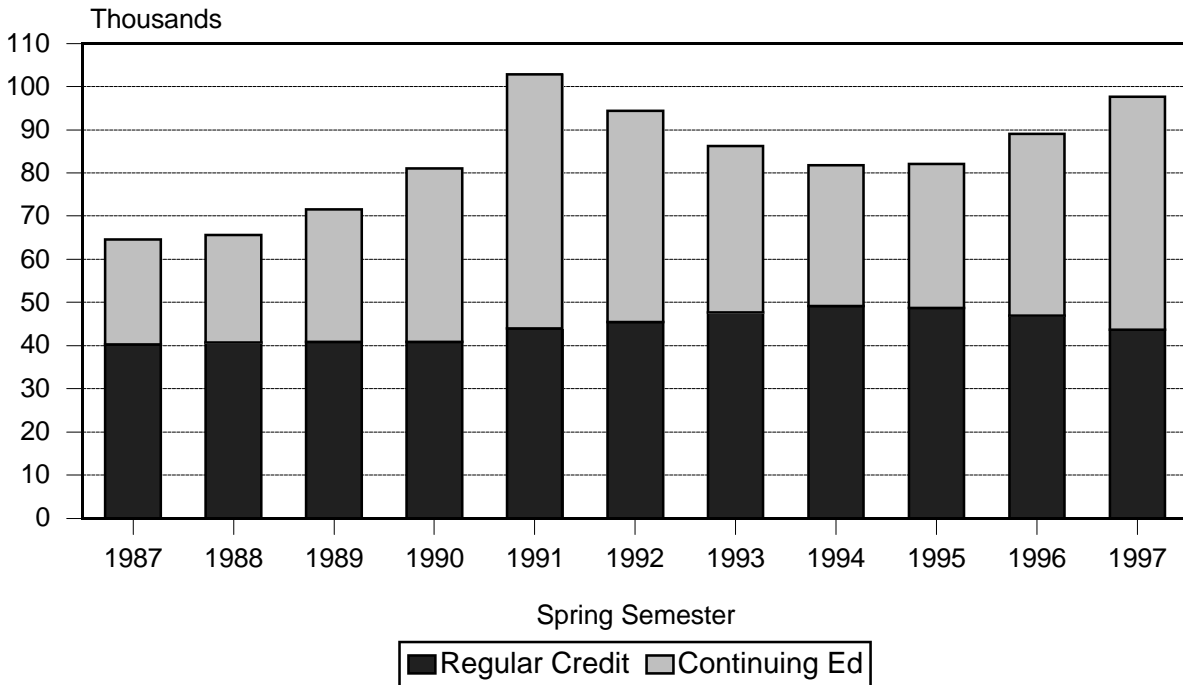
Continuing education enrollment increased 28% over Spring 1996, the second consecutive year of double digit increase, while regular credit enrollment declined 7%, the third straight year of decline (Figure 2). In the ten year period from Spring 1987 to Spring 1997, continuing education has grown at an average annual rate of over 9%, while regular credit enrollment has grown at less than 1%. Again, the reader is advised to be aware that

since the continuing education counts are largely registration (i.e. duplicated) counts, the proportions for continuing education enrollment counts are overstated when compared to regular credit enrollment counts. In addition, continuing education enrollment levels fluctuate considerably from term to term and from year to year. The average growth rates given do not imply steady increase.

Enrollment in credit programs at the UH Community Colleges in Spring 1997 represented 52.0% of all credit enrollment at the University of Hawai'i (Figure 4). UH Mānoa was next at 41.1% of total credit enrollment. UH Hilo accounted for 5.6% of the credit enrollment, and UH-West O'ahu 1.3%. For non-credit enrollment, UH Mānoa accounted for 59.5% of the UH system total, with the UH Community Colleges next at 39.3%. UH Hilo accounted for the remaining 1.2%.

Total enrollment at the University of Hawai'i grew from Spring 1987 through Spring 1991, when it reached a high of 102,800 (Table 3 and Figure 1). Thereafter, total enrollment declined somewhat before increasing again in Spring 1995. The addition of Community Service enrollment data to the Continuing Education counts for UH Mānoa in beginning in Spring 1996 has given those numbers a strong boost. The reporting of total enrollments becomes increasingly comprehensive from year to year. Therefore, the reader is advised to exercise caution when drawing conclusions based upon the historical series.

Percentage Change in Enrollment

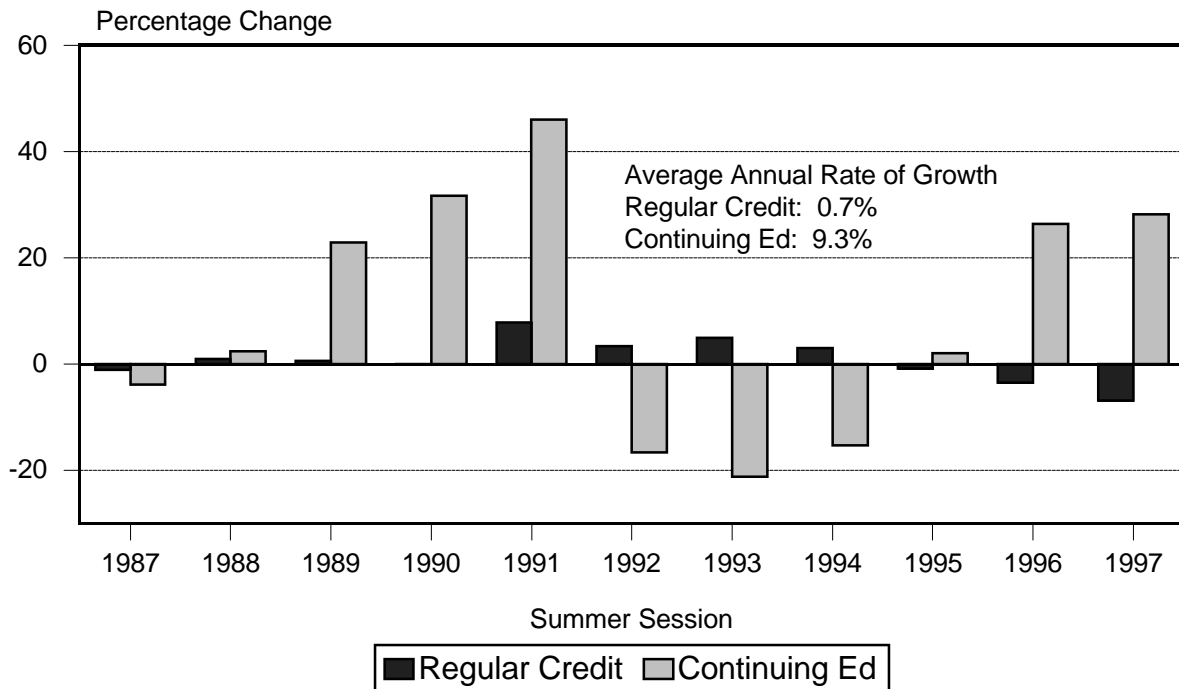

Enrollment of All Students, By Campus, Spring 1997

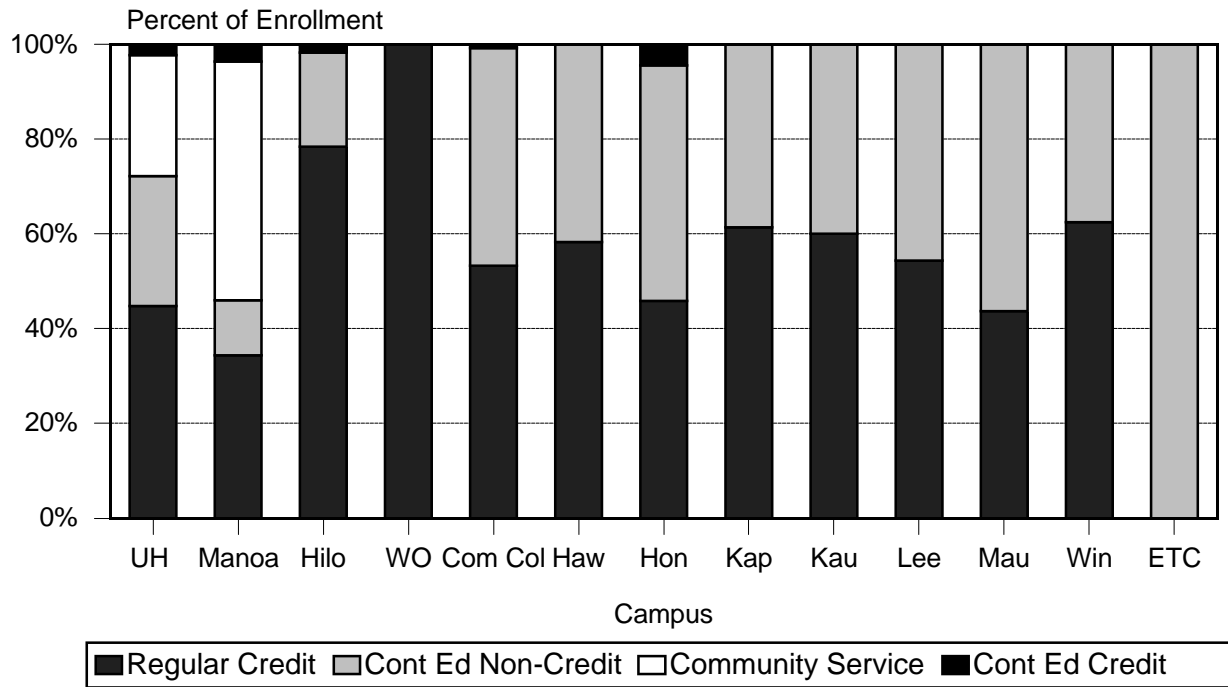

Percent of Total Enrollment, By Credit / Non-Credit, Spring 1997

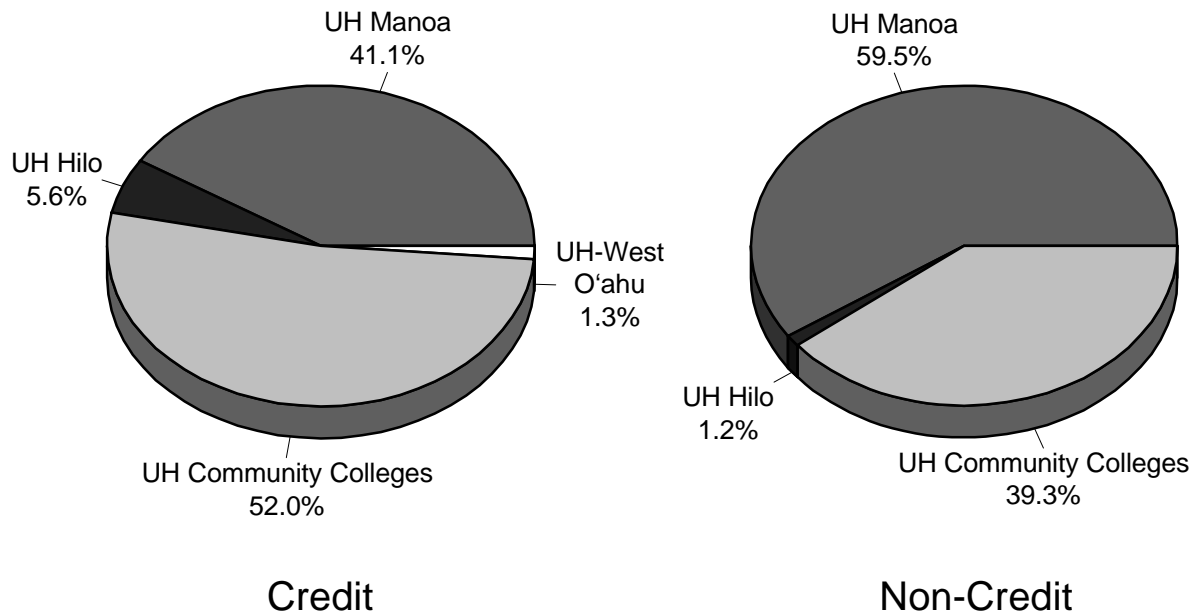

1/ The counts given here are a sum of unduplicated headcounts in regular credit courses at each campus and duplicated registration counts in non-credit courses in continuing education. Since non-credit counts are not as rigorously audited as regular credit counts, the reader is advised to exercise caution when drawing conclusions based upon this historical series.

2/ Beginning in Fall 1991, Hawaii Community College was transferred organizationally from UH Hilo to the UH Community College System. Data for prior years have been adjusted accordingly.
