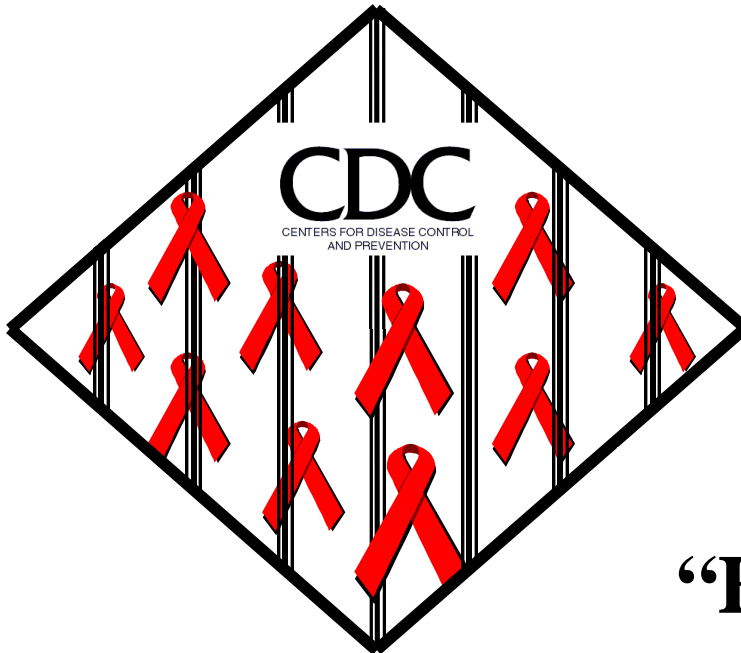

# Strategies for Developing an HIV Prevention Program With Corrections

The information below recommends strategies for organizations and individuals interested in working with corrections to develop an HIV prevention program with incarcerated men, women and juveniles.

- Contact your state and local departments of health (see link below to state DOHs).

  - Speak with the state and local HIV/AIDS director or program manager familiar with prison activities and ask about programs in corrections including community organizations and state and local HIV Prevention Community Planning Groups.
- Contact your state and local departments of corrections (see link below to State DOCs)

  - Speak with the medical director at the state level; ask about the HIV prevention programs and how to contact the information officers, education directors, and medical directors in your local correctional facilities.
  - Ask these local facilities about their HIV prevention programs.
  - Make an appointment with the warden or sheriff of each facility to offer to help enhance their HIV prevention program; describe the benefits (e.g., reduced recidivism, medical costs, and infection; increased education, training materials).
- Collaborate with partner organizations such as your state and local HIV Prevention Community Planning Groups, health care providers, AIDS organizations, businesses, foundations, faith organizations, and universities.
  - Invite their on-going commitment in funding, planning, coordinating and delivering HIV prevention programs for incarcerated persons including discharge planning and follow-up programs for ex-offenders.

- Identify existing HIV prevention activities and any gaps (needs). Build community partnerships and collaboration.
  - Well-trained peers are highly effective in delivering information and counseling. A message is often more impactful coming from audience members.
  - Seek creative sources of funding; for ideas, see the enclosed page on funding or call 800-458-5231.
  - Don't be discouraged if your program takes time to establish. Build relationships and activities step by step.
  - Remember: You are a guest inside the correctional facilities -- where security is a top priority.
  - Focus on your program. You are not there as an advocate for inmate complaints outside of your program.
  - Holistic approaches make a real difference. Many offenders are overwhelmed by multiple personal problems. Addressing critical needs, such as substance abuse, is necessary before dealing with other issues such as HIV prevention.
  - Remember: People don't change life long patterns overnight. Prevention takes long-term investment.
