## Registering to Vote in Oregon

Registration by mail is now the method most people use to register to vote in Oregon. Forms are located in most banks and public buildings, in every county elections office and in many state agencies. They also can be obtained from the Secretary of State, Elections Division.

After completing the Voter Registration Form, mail it directly to the elections office of the county in which you reside. (See county list below.) The county elections office will mail you a card to let you know that your registration was received. Please remember that for newly registered voters, the card must be postmarked by the 21st day before an election in order to vote in that election. If you have any questions, be sure to call your county elections office.

You are required to furnish your full name, date of birth, signature, political party preference, and residence address (and mailing address, if different than your residence address). Your residence address must be the address where you reside - not a post office box.

In Oregon, anyone with a felony

conviction who is not incarcerated can vote. Even if you are on probation, parole or post-prison supervision.

But first you have to register to vote.

You can register to vote in Oregon by visiting your county clerk's office, while getting your driver's license, or at any post office.
