Registering to Vote in Utah

To register to vote in Utah you must be:
 a citizen of the United States
 a Utah resident for at least 30 days before the election

18 years old on or before the next election

An individual who is incarcerated for committing a felony is not eligible to vote, but the right to vote is restored when he or she is sentenced to probation, is granted parole, or successfully completes the term of incarceration.

Where To Register in Utah:

County Clerk's Office. You can register in person in your county clerk's office at any time. In order to be eligible to vote in a particular election, you must register before the 7th day immediately preceding the date of the election.

By-Mail. By-mail voter registration forms can be printed from the Lt. Governor's website and mailed to your county clerk. By-mail voter registration forms are also available in the phone book, at post offices and in libraries. Forms must be postmarked at least 20 days before an election.

Driver License and State Agency Offices. Voter registration forms are available at Utah Driver License Offices, at agencies that offer public assistance and state-funded assistance to the disabled, including offices of the Division of Workforce Services; Utah State Department of Health Women, Infant and Children (WIC); Division of Services for People with Disabilities; Department of Rehabilitation; public colleges and universities that provide services to the disabled; and armed forces recruitment offices. Agency forms must be turned in to the agency office at least 20 days before an election.
