# EPORTFOLIO FACT SHEET





### REQUIRED COMPONENT

Introduction (~500 words)

#### Resume

Artifacts
Minimum: 6
Maximum: 12

At least one for each SLO (At most two per SLO)

Although artifacts can come from core or elective courses, to graduate you MUST complete a coreeligible course for each SLO.



#### DETAILS

- Sets the tone and context for the ePortfolio
- Introduces your professional goals and aspirations
- · Paints a personal story
- Lists your professional objectives
- Lists your degrees, work experiences and technical skills
- Lists other relevant experiences (e.g. internships, practicums, volunteer work)
- Artifacts can be from a core or elective course, or an internship, practicum or extramural project
- An artifact can take many forms: essay, video, poster, display, group project, etc.
- Artifacts can be a single culminating assignment or a string of shorter assignments from a given course
- If you use a group project as an artifact, you must specify your individual contribution in the reflective essay
- You may not use the same artifact for multiple SLO reflective essays
- We encourage you to apply the artifact to the course's primary SLO
- Do not edit artifacts once they've been graded; leave them as is in your ePortfolio

## REQUIRED COMPONENT

Reflective Essays Total: 6 (~1000 words each)

Start early on these essays and continually refine them.

Make your ePortfolio tell your own story!

## DETAILS

- The core of your ePortfolio and what faculty will evaluate in your final semester (on a Pass/Revise basis)
- Should incorporate insights and specific/concrete examples of your learning process from at least one (and up to two) artifacts in a single essay
- Provide at least two relevant scholarly references with proper and consistent citations
- We highly encourage you to refer to the Guiding Questions for ePortfolio Essays for help with crafting your essays

Conclusion (~500 words)

- Discuss steps towards achieving your professional goals and aspirations
- Explain how you plan to apply what you have learned to a specific information environment, community of interest, or problem.

Public Presentation (10-15 minutes + Q&A)

- Will be scheduled in your graduating semester during the exiting seminar
- Based on the scenario: As an LIS professional, who will you help, how will you help them, and how do we know you can do it?
- Cite selectively from your ePortfolio to support your response
- Not scored; you will receive feedback from faculty, peers, and others in attendance
