Division Overview

The Community Pediatrics Division is a team of general pediatricians, ambulatory pediatric subspecialists, researchers, and family advocates who are engaged in a variety of academic and direct service activities that support a common philosophy that pediatrics must aim to treat children as human beings and consider the full context of their lives—their families, communities, cultures, and personal stories. The philosophy is promoted by engaging in clinical care in a variety of hospital and community settings; by training others about the practical application of community pediatrics; by advocating for policies and practices that will weave these values into the health care system; and by conducting research to develop new ideas and to improve practices. The need for community pediatrics is especially pronounced when looking at underserved and vulnerable children. Therefore, the Division places special emphasis on programs and initiatives that will improve care for these populations.

Clinical Activities

The Division's clinical activities include the general and subspecialty care of children and families in the Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children (KMCWC) newborn nursery, Kapi'olani Medical Specialists Clinics, Pediatric Outpatient Clinical and Kapi'olani Child Protection Center, and at the Queen Emma Clinics, Kokua Kalihi Valley Comprehensive Family Services, Family Court's Detention Center, and the Hawai'i Youth Correctional Facility. Division members care for about 70% of newborns delivered at KMCWC (roughly 2,500-3,000 infants/year). Each year, about 12,000 children visit the Pediatric Outpatient Clinic for acute and Well Child Care.

Division members also provide ambulatory pediatric services at the Queen Emma Clinic and Kokua Kalihi Valley Health Center. In addition, the Division provides subspecialty services in developmental and behavioral pediatrics, adolescent medicine, child physical and sexual abuse, and pediatric consultative care for children hospitalized at Shriners Hospital and general pediatric expertise for Kpi'olani's multidisciplinary clinics including obesity treatment and craniofacial clinic.

Medical Education, Advocacy & Research

The Community Pediatrics Division is responsible for medical student, resident, nurse practitioner, and premedical education for the University of Hawai'i Pediatric Residency Program's (UHPRP) Continuity of Care Primary Care Program.

<u>Hawaii Institute for Childhood Obesity Research and</u> Education (HICORE)

HICORE was developed in 2008, through generous funding from the Hawai'i Medical Service Association (HMSA)

Foundation, to provide leadership for a collaborative, multi-disciplinary effort in research and education on childhood and adolescent obesity in Hawai'i. The goals of HICORE are: 1) to serve as a repository of childhood and adolescent obesity research projects conducted in Hawai'i; 2) to provide guidance to granting agencies and foundations regarding research priorities in the area of childhood and adolescent obesity for the state of Hawai'i; 3) to serve as a center for the education of community members, medical students, residents, physicians, and others in the area of childhood and adolescent obesity in Hawai'i; and 4) to conduct research on childhood and adolescent obesity relevant to people of Hawai'i. HICORE is collaborating with the Department of Health Healthy Hawai'i Initiative to provide a CME seminar on early childhood prevention to pediatric providers at community health centers.. 2019-2020 Highlights

We've been focusing on the same issue as everyone else in medicine for much of this year. We started by providing only sick child care until we were able to set up safe care for both sick and well children. We now provide care for sick patients of many of the children of the pediatricians in the community who do not feel equipped to do so.

Division Chief, **Gina M. French, MD** is also Associate Program Director of the Pediatric Residency and the Medical Director of the Pediatric Outpatient Clinic at KMCWC and has a Pediatric Behavioral Clinic in the Pediatric Clinic that focuses on children with challenging behavioral conditions. She is the chair of the Newborn Standards of Excellence Committee, serves on the EPIC Pediatric Committee and is chair of the Physician Assistance Committee.

Teresa Bane-Terakubo, MD is the medical director at the Queen's Medical Center Pediatric Clinic and is responsible for the continuity curriculum there. She also works at the pediatric clinic at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children.

Maureen Chang, MD coordinates the Reach Out and Read program for the Pediatric Outpatient Clinic. This program is an evidence based literacy improvement program that provides free books and anticipatory guidance on reading to children to the families in our clinic.

Diane Lynne Ching, or as we refer to her, "the original Diane Ching" (since she did her residency with us in the 90's 20 years before we were lucky enough to have her return), teaches in the nursery and helps provide

coordination and a pediatric perspective for the multidisciplinary craniofacial clinic.

Kristen "Brooke" Hallett joined the division in the fall. She was introduced to the community by giving grand rounds Pia Francisco-Natanauan, MD provides clinical care to incarcerated youth at the Detention Center and the Hawai'i Youth Correctional Facility. In addition she provides consultative services to adolescents in the specialty center at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children. She has particular interest in eating disorders and contraceptive care.

Joan Meister, MD provides leadership in the Craniofacial Clinic and is renowned for her teaching in the nursery. She has received the medical student teaching award and resident teaching award in addition to the general consensus that "Joan is great".

Kayalvizhi Natarajan, MD teaches in the continuity clinic at Queen's Medical Center and provides services to sexually and physical abused children through the Kapi 'olani Center for the Protection of Children and Sexual Abuse Treatment Center.

Brenda M. Nishikawa, MD in addition to her excellent care to a panel of medically fragile children at the clinic, coordinates the ambulatory pediatrics rotation. The rotation provides pediatric residents with a rich immersion experience in provision of care in the outpatient setting at Kapi'olani Pediatric Outpatient in addition to exposing them to a wide array of services community services for children. There are several highly esteemed pediatricians in the community who decided to become pediatricians after meeting and working with Dr. Nishikawa. She has received the medical student outpatient teaching award.

Jeffrey K. Okamoto, MD is now full time in clinical developmental and behavioral pediatrics at KMCWC. He is on the Council Management Committee for the national American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and is the incoming Vice-President for the Hawai'i chapter of the AAP.

May M. Okihiro, MD is continuing to study the development of metabolic syndrome in Native Hawaiian and Samoan youth (funded by the NIH/NCMHD and JABSOM Department of Native Hawaiian Health's Center for Native and Pacific Health Disparities. She published with her colleagues at Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center in the Hawai'i Medical Journal this year.

Brittany Raffa, MD Had the major pediatric production of having twin boys this spring. She continues to work with us part time in the clinic

Alicia Turlington, MD provides pediatric care and training at Kalihi Kokua Valley Community Health Center. The Center has a unique program providing legal services for families obtaining care at the pediatric clinic. Dr. Turlington's particular interest is in providing integrated community based care for families living with the multiple burdens of poverty and inequity. She has provided innovative group well care at KKV.

Yolanda Wu, MD has been serving in an administrative role, managing the schedule and morale in addition to her clinical work in the clinic and at Shriner's. She has been providing community service as room mother to two classrooms in two schools is the assistant cubmaster in charge of activities and recently completed the Wood Badge.

Our 84 bed, single-room neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) ran at capacity through most of this year. There were 1091 admissions to the NICU (down from 1130 one year ago). The average daily census in the NICU was 74 (down from 77 one year ago). Of these admissions, 175 were very low birth weight (up from 172 last year). The neonatology division maintains a very close working relation with the Maternal Fetal Medicine group. Weekly conferences are held with the neonatologists, maternal fetal medicine specialists and their fellows. The NICU measures its outcomes using the Vermont Oxford Network (VON) database. VON is the largest NICU database in the United States and Kapi'olani benchmarks itself to Type C units with similar risk profiles. In spite of consistently high census and acuity in its clinical services, our NICU consistently ranks above the top quartile on all of its major VON measures, including very low birth weight (VLBW) overall morbidity, NEC, nosocomial infection, overall mortality and human milk intake at discharge. In addition to 24-hour in-house coverage in the NICU and Labor & Delivery at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children, the division also provides 24-hour consultation coverage for Level II neonatal services in Labor and Delivery and the Newborn Nursery at Queen's Medical Center. We also provide telephone

advice to Pediatricians on our neighbor islands and throughout the Pacific Rim in management of complex neonatal cases. To further our outreach with local and neighbor island providers, our group has flown out to provide neonatal resuscitation training. During COVID, we are expanding our outreach by using on-line conferencing platforms for education.

Neonatal Transport Services remain very active. The Kapi'olani transport team participated in 227 neonatal transports. Of these, 169 neighbor island transports came to Kapi'olani and 42 were taken to Kaiser Hospital. There were 49 transports from Oahu facilities to Kapi'olani. There were 9 outgoing neonatal transports, including 7 to the mainland and 3 to Straub Hospital for cardiac catheterizations. In addition, the division provides ongoing supervision and training for our highly qualified transport nurses and respiratory therapists.

There were 230 patient evaluations in the Neonatal Medical Follow-up Clinic last year (down from 264 last year). This clinic provides continuity of care for NICU graduates that require close medical follow-up for resolving medical conditions post-discharge. Neurodevelopmental follow-up of our high-risk NICU graduates is provided by Dr. Mari Uehara, Jaymie Pinho, NP and the Rehab Services at the Kapi olani Specialty Center. Last year there were 90 clinic encounters. The

current Director for NICU Medical and Neurodevelopmental Clinic is Dr. Pat Chun.

The Pulmonary Hypertension (PH) Team is a multidisciplinary collaboration between Neonatology, Pediatric Critical Care, Pediatric Cardiology Pediatric Pulmonology, formed in 2016. Dr. Sheree Kuo played a lead role in development and evolution of this team. In addition, the PH team, on average, follows 30-40 patients at a time, with ten pediatric in-patients with PH, the majority being former premature infants with bronchopulmonary dysplasia. The PH team then follows these patients after discharge in their interdisciplinary Pediatric Pulmonary Hypertension Clinic. In this clinic, patients are seen by intensivists (either neonatology or pediatric critical care), apediatric cardiologist and apediatric pulmonologist. Additional ancillary services available in PH clinic include dietary counseling, physical and occupational therapy and speech therapy.

The Hanuola ECMO program at KMCWC is the only extracorporeal life support program in Hawai'i. Drs. Len Tanaka, Sheree Kuo and Jaime Harrington serve as Medical Director and Associate Medical Directors for Hanuola. The program is a cooperative collaboration between Neonatology, Pediatric Critical Care and Pediatric Surgery. In addition to Dr. Kuo, Drs. Megan Doty, Christopher Gibu, Richard Jack and Charles Neal are ECMO certified physicians, helping to provide 24/7 consultation and treatment services in the NICU. Dr Alexandra Ramnath is in the process of becoming an ECMO certified physician. There was one Neonatal ECMO run last year in a critically ill newborn, who survived to discharge to home. In 2020, Hanuola was awarded the ELSO Center of Excellence in Life Support, a Gold Level designation.

Our accredited joint fellowship program with Tripler Army Medical Center is one of three military neonatology fellowships in the country. There is one fellow in our program in 2019-2020: Dr Lauren Staiger. Weekly fellows conferences are conducted which cover case studies, morbidity and mortality, basic science topics, clinical journal critiques and quality improvement. This academic year we were one of the co-creators, spearheaded by Dr Lynn Iwamoto, of an on-line multi-state Fellowship QI Curriculum conference. The other two programs are Seattle Children's and Oregon Health & Sciences University, and we anticipate more western state fellowship programs will participate, to include a Canadian provincial fellowship program.

Several members of the Neonatology Division are involved in a variety of research projects. These include pharmaceutical sponsored trials, clinical studies

and quality improvement projects. The division continues to participate with faculty support at the annual HPH Summer Student Research Program as well as independent summer student research projects.

The **Optimist** trial, which recently closed for enrollment, targeted neonates born between 25 and 28 weeks gestation who are less than 6 hours of age and failing non-invasive ventilation due to RDS. Enrolled patients were given surfactant via a small bore catheter while spontaneously breathing on non-invasive respiratory support. A total of 486 infants where enrolled and randomized. The primary investigator of this study is Dr. Sheree Kuo.

The Merck RSV Vaccine Study is a double-blind, randomized, placebo-controlled, single ascending dose study to evaluate the safety, tolerability, and pharmacokinetics of MK-1654 in preterm and term infants. We are currently enrolling babies in our NICU for this phase II trial. The primary investigator of this study is Dr. Venkataraman Balaraman; Dr. Pattaraporn Chun is in the process of becoming a co-investigator. The Medimmune RSV Vaccine Study is a phase 2/3 randomized, double-blind, palivizumab-controlled study to evaluate the safety of MEDI8897, a Monoclonal Antibody with an Extended Halflife against RSV, in high-risk children. Preparation for enrollment in this study is near completion and the primary investigator of this study is Dr. Venkataraman Balaraman; Dr Pattaraporn Chun is in the process of becoming a coinvestigator.

The new phase of NOVI (Neurobehavioral Outcomes of Very Preterm Infants) is now known as **NOVI-ECHO**, an NIH funded extension of the NOVI study of neonates born at <30 weeks gestation. The purpose of ECHO (Environmental Influences of Child Health Outcomes) in the NOVI cohort is to follow home and environment effects on early neurobehavioral development using several cognitive and Neuromotor assessments at 5 and 6 years of age. The primary investigator of this study is Dr. Charles Neal. Last year 6 manuscripts were published and currently two are in press and three are under review. The Hawai'i IDeA Center for Pediatric and Adolescent Clinical Trials (HIPACT) is an NIH funded multicenter clinical trials grant, funded under the ECHO umbrella. HIPACT is presently developing two neonatal protocols with our Hawai'i population. Both studies presently ongoing are related to Neonatal Opioid Withdrawal Syndrome (NOWS). The randomized study of two treatment protocols will be initiated in the NICU. The HIPACT Pre-Peri-Postnatal Subcommittee chair for this study is Dr. Charles Neal. Drs. Akshatha and Wong-Ramsey are co-investigator in the NOWS study. Our Neonatal-Perinatal fellow

Dr. Lauren Staiger is working on Body Composition in Infants of Diabetic Mother. Drs Sheree Kuo and Kara Wong-Ramsey are Co-PIs. Drs Kuo and Wong-Ramsey are also working on a 3D body scanning of infant body composition in collaboration with Dr. John Shepherd at the UH Cancer Research Center.

Each division member remains active in Hospital and Pediatric Department Committees, as well as all levels of medical school and resident education. Dr. Megan Doty is the NICU Rotation Director for Pediatric Residency Program. Dr. Kara Wong-Ramsey is the MS3 NICU Rotation Director for JABSOM Pediatrics. Several members of the division are also active in hospital and department leadership. Dr. Venkataraman Balaraman is Vice-Chair for Clinical Affairs in Pediatrics. Dr. Charles Neal is Division Head for Neonatology and maintains his role as Medical Director for the NICU. Dr. Lynn Iwamoto is on the quality council. She is currently actively involved with breastmilk feeding, ROP and PDA management in our preterm infants. She is also involved with newborn hearing evaluation and improving NICU discharge and decreasing length of stay. She on the Dept of Pediatrics CME Committee and JABSOM Academic Appeals Committee. Dr. Richard Jack is working on reducing invasive testing in the NICU as part of an active QI project. Dr. Sheree Kuo is Medical Director of Neonatal Transport services. Dr. Richard Jack is the Associate Medical Director of Neonatal Transport. Dr. Kuo is also Associate Director of the Hanuola ECMO program. She is also on the Dept of Peds Personnel Committee and Pediatric Residency Recruitment & Selection Committee. She is the Chair, AAP District VIII Section on Neonatal -Perinatal Medicine and Board Member, Hawai'i Mothers' Milk, Inc. Dr. Sneha Sood is Medical Director of the Newborn nursery at Queens Medical Center. Dr. Kara Wong Ramsey is Assistant Medical Director of the Newborn nursery at Queens Medical Center. Dr Pat Chun is the Director of the

NICU and Neurodevelopmental Clinic. Dr. Chris Gibu is on the Code Blue Committee, RAD/POCUS Committee, RESUS Committee and Golden Hour Committee. Dr. Alex Ramnath is also on the Code Blue Committee and the Perinatal Working Group Committee. Dr. Sneha Sood, with assistance of Dr. Emmanuel Kling, is the neighbor island liaison working on neonatal resuscitation on the training. Dr. Kling is Departmental Communication Committee. Dr. Kandie George is our current Palliative Care NICU Liaison, working with Jamie Sharpe and the rest of the palliative care team in supporting our NICU families. They developed a comfort care order set, as well as admission and discharge note templates for physicians, to ease their workflow for a dying baby. She has been active with comfort care nursing education.

This coming academic year Dr. Madeline Jacobson, a graduating neonatologist, will join our group. Dr. Jim Mueggenberg will join our hospitalist group and Maria Tereza Untanu, NNP, will join our NP group.

The division remains highly dedicated to meeting our mission of providing the highest quality clinical care, education, research and community service.

The Division is dedicated to the treatment of children and adolescents with blood diseases and cancer. The outpatient clinic if located on the second floor of the Kapi'olani Medical Center in the Pediatric Ambulatory Unit (PAU), and hospitalized patients are cared for on the Wilcox ward. The staff is comprised of six practicing pediatric hematologist/oncologists, hematology/oncology hospitalist, pediatric advanced practice pediatric oncology nurses, a social worker, an oncology pharmacist, and a full complement of oncology nurses. Division members collaboratively within the John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM), the School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene (SONDH), the University of Hawaii Cancer Center (UHCC), and the Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children. The Division meets the guidelines for a children's Hematology-Oncology Level III Center by the American Academy of Pediatrics. Kapi'olani's dedicated team is the only one of its kind in the state and cares for 98% of Hawaii's children who are diagnosed with cancer. Approximately 40 new oncology cases are seen each year and 150 children are on active treatment at any one time. Two hundred additional patients are followed in the long-term followup clinic. Between three to five bone marrow transplants are performed for children of the state each year in the only hematopoietic stem cell transplant center in the State of Hawai'i. Approximately 50 patients with hematology problems are followed in the PAU, and ten new consultations are provided each month.

Cooperative Group Membership

We are a Member Institution of the Children's Oncology Group (COG), a national organization sponsored by the National Cancer Institute, dedicated to the treatment and cure of childhood cancer. Phase II and III are clinical and biologic trials are available through COG and is also the Medical Director for the Hawai'i Pacific Health Research Institute. Some members also participate in COG by serving on Disease Committees. We are a Member Institution of the Beat Childhood Cancer Research Consortium, an international group of over 40 universities and children's hospitals offering Phase I and II clinical trials utilizing new agents and molecular targeting. Randal Wada, MD serves as the institutional principal investigator as well as being a member of the Consortium's Scientific Committee. All Division members actively enroll the majority of patients on these trials. Through Desiree Medeiros, MD, the Division is also part of the Western States Regional Hemophilia Network.

Specialty Clinics

The Division staffs a number of speciality clinics that are available to Hawai'i's children and adolescents. These include the Hemophilia and Thrombosis Treatment Center of Hawaii, Coagulopathy Clinic, Bone Marrow Transplant Clinic, Long-Term Follow-up (LTFU) Clinic for survivors of childhood cancer, and an Adolescent and Young Adult LTFU clinic. There are several neighbor island Hemophilia Outreach clinics.

Teaching

Division members participate actively in the education of medical students, graduate students, pediatric residents, community physicians, and community groups throughout the State of Hawai'i. Advanced practice pediatric oncology nurses are involved in hospital nursing orientation and ongoing oncology education in the hospital and community. They assist children on cancer treatment with school reintegration and give lectures at schools throughout the State. Division members sit on numerous hospital committees and attend and participate in the monthly educational Pediatric Tumor Board.

Research

Division members actively participate in clinical and basic research in oncology and hematology. Bench and translational research in non-Hodgkin lymphoma take place in laboratories at the Department of Tropical Medicine, Medical Microbiology & Pharmacology. Clinical research is ongoing through involvement with the Children's Oncology Group, Blood and Marrow Transplant Clinical Trials Network, Beat Childhood Cancer Consortium, Pediatric Blood and Marrow Transplant Consortium, the Center for Health Outcomes, and JABSOM. Health behavior research is also conducted through the SONDH.

Professional and University Service

Darryl Glaser, MD serves as Medical Director for Hematology/Oncology, and is a member of the hospital's Cancer Committee. Kelley Hutchins, DO, MPH serves as Medical Director for the Adolescent and Young Adult Long Term Follow Up Clinic. Jasmin Jensen, MD is the Medical Director of Navian Hawai'i's Pediatric Hospice team, as well as Hawai'i Pacific Health's clinical apheresis program. In addition to his work with COG and the Hawai'i Pacific Health Research Institute, Wade Kyono, MD is a member the University of Hawai'i

Cancer Center's Minority Underserved-NCI Community Oncology Research Program (UHCC MU-NCORP), and is the Vice Chair of the COG NCORP Committee. Desiree Medeiros, MD is Medical Director of the Hemophilia and Thrombosis Treatment Center of Hawai'i, and a member of the Western States Regional Coordinating Committee. She also serves on the hospital's Blood Utilization Committee and Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee. Bruce Shiramizu, MD is a Professor in the Departments of Pediatrics and Tropical Medicine, Medical Microbiology & Pharmacology (TMMMP). He is also an investigator in the Hawai'i Center for AIDS, and serves as the Associate Chair of Research in Pediatrics, as well as having leadership roles in various clinical translation research infrastructure grants at JABSOM. Randal Wada, MD is an Associate Professor in the Departments of Pediatrics and Nursing with JABSOM and SONDH. He is director of the Pediatric Hematopoietic Progenitor Cell Transplantation program at the Kapi'olani Children's Blood and Cancer Center, and serves as the Medical Director of the Hawaii Bone Marrow Donor Registry and the Hawai'i Cord Blood Bank. Robert Wilkinson, MD retired from clinical practice in January of 2016 after 42 years of serving the community. He continues to maintain his faculty position at JABSOM and his membership in COG, and remains active in teaching medical students and residents.

Cancer Support Services/ Community Groups

The Division coordinates two patient and family support groups: the Childhood Caner Connection for families and **SCARS** (Strength. Courage. Appreciation, Remembrance, and Support) for adolescents and young adults touched by cancer. Most Division members participate in camps for patients and families throughout the year, three sponsored by private foundations, and one by the Hemophilia Foundation of Hawai'i. Many also work with the Hawai'i Children's Cancer Foundation assisting families with financial, educational and service needs. Division members serve on the board or committees of community organizations, such as the Hawaii Children's Cancer Foundation, the Hemophilia Foundation of Hawai'i, the American Cancer Society, HUGS, the Let Grace In Foundation, HPAREF, Hospice Hawai'i, Make-A-Wish Hawai'i, Legacy of Life Hawai'i, and the Oncology Nursing Society.

Accomplishments and Future Goals

Over the past year the Apheresis Program has added therapeutic leukapheresis to their existing peripheral blood stem cell collection, plasmapheresis, and red blood cell exchange services. Thanks to foundation grant funding, the Division hosted the first speaker in its Masters of Pediatric Hematology Virtual Lecture Series, and has also hired a Pediatric Oncology Quality Program Coordinator. Future plans include developing an extra-corporeal photopheresis service within the Apheresis Program, as well as point of care ultrasound for the Hemophilia and Thrombosis Treatment Center. Dr. Stephanie Si Lim, MD, a pediatric oncologist with expertise in cellular therapy will begin a joint appointment in the Division while she develops a clinical research program with the UHCC. In 2020 the Division will be hosting the SIOP (International Society of Pediatric Oncology) World Congress in Honolulu and organizing the educational sessions. We will continue to provide compassionate, state-of-the- art pediatric cancer care to the children of Hawai'i and the Pacific Islands through participation in cooperative group clinical trials, to advance hematology and oncology research in the State of Hawai'i, and excel in teaching medical students and residents through the University of Hawai'i John A. Burns School of Medicine.

The Division

The pediatric hospitalist division at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children was established in 2002. Since its inception, the pediatric hospitalist group has grown from a group of 3 to 19 to provide greater coverage for the keiki of Hawai'i. We continue to collaborate with the ever growing group of pediatric subspecialists to provide outstanding inpatient care for complex and high acuity pediatric patients. We continue to develop, update and implement evidence-based guidelines and order sets to provide the latest evidenced based care to our patients. We are also excited as Pediatric Hospitalist Medicine becomes a board-recognized pediatric subspecialty and we continue to collaborate with our colleagues around the country. In the inaugural year that the board exam was given, we had 6 hospitalists sit for the exam.

Mission Statement

As the cornerstone of inpatient pediatric care at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children, the Pediatric Hospitalist Division is committed to excellence. In this role, we strive to provide excellent inpatient pediatric care to the children of the State of Hawai'i and the Pacific

Islands/Pacific Rim, provide a base for emerging research initiatives in inpatient pediatric care, and remain innovative educators in pediatrics through the University of Hawai'i John A. Burns School of Medicine and through the Pediatric Residency Program.

We care for the children admitted to the general pediatric ward at Kapi olani Medical Center for Women & Children and provide consultation services to both the medical and surgical subspecialists. Of the 2500 admissions we handle annually, the children range from those who are otherwise healthy and present to the hospital with minor acute illness to those with complex chronic medical needs requiring a high level of care. All are provided with state- of-the-art medical care, in a child-friendly environment, with an emphasis on world class, family-centered care.

Teaching

The pediatric hospitalist division continues to prioritize the mentoring and development of future physicians, in particular future pediatricians. Our division members hold University of Hawai'i faculty appointments and teach a variety of learners from visiting students from medical schools and universities all over the world to our own

JABSOM medical students and Hawai'i Residency Program trainees. As a division, we have third and fourth year medical students rotate with us on the wards during their inpatient pediatric rotation, building their fund of knowledge of bread and butter as well as complex pediatric disease processes. We provide a wide range of didactic and bedside educational experiences during the inpatient rotation: students participate in initial evaluation and management of newly admitted patients, rotate on a large and busy ward team, and are provided a weeklong 1:1 learning opportunity with our hospitalist attendings, including daily didactic sessions covering core topics. Division members also provide structured educational and clinical supervision for pediatric, family practice, and psychiatry residents on their pediatric inpatient rotations.

Dr. Jennifer Di Rocco remains an Associate Program Director for the residency program and provides a bridge between the hospitalists and residency program. Dr. Di Rocco has taken on a lead role in the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education Pediatric Milestones 2.0 Committee, traveling to meet with experts from around the country to create performance milestones within the clinical competencies for resident learners. Dr. Di Rocco also provides guidance to our division on completing evaluations of our learners and how to best assist the struggling learner. Additionally, Dr. Di Rocco has been instrumental in resurrecting our division journal club and helping to develop our case review forum. Dr. Jordan Kono has joined Dr. Di Rocco in overseeing these educational sessions and supporting hospitalist members in preparing these sessions. This past year, journal club topics have covered creating practice guidelines for pediatric somatic symptoms and related disorders, in which child and adolescent psychiatry participated, early in the pandemic we discussed COVID-19 in children and the overlap that some centers were seeing with Kawasaki disease, and we discussed how frequently well-appearing infants with urinary tract infections are to have meningitis. Our case review forum discussions bring in a wide variety of guests from nursing staff, respiratory therapists, subspecialists, and our quality and safety team. Topics covered this last year were sepsis, utilization of our respiratory therapist driven asthma pathway, and residency duty hours. Both the case review forums and journal club sessions are well-attended and impact the care that we provide as a division.

Dr. Kyra Len continues in her role as Department of Pediatrics, Medical Student Director, and ensures that JABSOM medical students are provided exceptional experiences in each of their

clerkships and guides our group in constant building of our pediatric clerkship experience. She has published her work in development of the 4th year medical student boot camp and medical student wellness curriculum. Several hospitalists participate in the 4th year medical student bootcamp, with Dr. Tiffany Wang conducting a session on answering pages and calling consultants, and Dr. Marissa Fakaosita educating students on written communication and note writing, valuable skills that will serve them well throughout their medical careers.

Our hospitalists take on roles to inspire medical students whether they are interested in pursuing a career in pediatrics or not. Numerous division members are POD-visors, preceptors during the pediatric clerkship, longitudinal clinical mentors (LCM), advisors for the Pediatric Interest Group (PIG), interviewers for the medical school, and Practice Based Learning (PBL) tutors.

Dr. Barry Mizuo is the Pediatric Clerkship Director and continues to ensure that the third year students receive a comprehensive pediatrics experience. He provides the third year students with simulation sessions during their clerkship to augment their learning. He works alongside Dr. Diane Ching, who is the medical student inpatient rotation director. They both had to take on the additional challenges during the pandemic of creating a safe but also immersive experience for students.

Dr. Tiffany Wang remains in her role as inpatient pediatric resident rotation director and is constantly working to provide our residents with a valuable and educational experience. She has worked to ensure that the rotation falls within the prescribed duty hours and always keeps the residents' best interests in mind, both in terms of their well-being and their education. Dr. Wang also puts together reading materials and resources for the UH residents as well as visiting residents in an effort to enhance their wards learning experience.

Dr. Marissa Fakaosita has offered our residents the opportunity to customize their residency experience through the Individualized Education Unit (IEU). With the development of these electives, Dr. Fakaosita meets with community physicians throughout the state to offer a broader range of experiences for the residents. This is particularly important as we hope to encourage our residents to improve access to care in some of the more remote locations of the state and to also better understand the challenges and barriers that some of the more remote locations may face.

Additionally, Dr. Fakaosita is the site co-chair of the Residency Selection Committee and has worked tirelessly to provide the best representation of our program for interviewees from around the country. She interviews numerous candidates, sets up interview days and shares her expertise in behavioral interviewing techniques with the faculty to ensure that we find the best residency candidates for our program.

Division members have been the recipients of faculty teaching awards both from the medical students and from the residents. This past year awardees were Dr. Gina Ramirez for her role in resident education and Dr. Marissa Fakaosita for her role in medical student education.

Research. Quality, and Process Improvement Initiatives

The pediatric hospitalist division is uniquely situated to conduct outcomes research and implement meaningful quality improvement initiatives in the pediatric inpatient realm. Division members have been active throughout the year in institutional, local and national research and QI Projects.

Dr. Shilpa Patel continues her national work in IPASS handoffs and rolled out the IPASS bundle to nursing units across the HPH systems. Additionally, she took the lead on implementation of the IPASS Safe Communication on Rounds Every time (SCORE) Project to 21 national sites. We have been a part of the Society of Hospital Medicine project SCORE for the last 1.5 year, after being selected as one of the 21 national sites. This project brought the IPASS structure that our group has already been utilizing for handoffs and utilizes the mnemonic to create a structured communication tool to create a shared mental model between the physicians, nurses, and parents and families. Dr. Jessica Kosut is the site lead. Dr. Patel, Dr. Kosut and several hospitalists have since taught this structure to 150 medical students, 32 residents, 70 residents and 20 hospitalists. Our patients and families are grateful for the opportunity to participate in bedside rounds and to work with the medical team to develop a plan that is most appropriate for the patient. Our pediatric nurses have been a tremendous resource during this process and we have seen improved communication across the medical team.

Dr. James Lin continues his work on a system level, as Vice President of Information Technology for HPH and, in particular, assisted our division in utilizing doxy.me to conduct family centered rounds in the era of the pandemic. This allowed us to reduce the number of members of the medical team entering a patient room, while still allowing residents and medical students to interact with patients and families.

Dr. Patel had an article published in New England Journal of Medicine Innovations in Care Delivery regarding the COVID-19 Antibody testing conducted on employee at Hawai'i Pacific Health, including results, reasons for testing and what impact this had. This article was in addition to numerous other articles that Dr. Patel co-authored, including about IPASS handoffs, IPASS family centered care and about transitions of care.

Dr. Kyra Len did some novel work with medical students and Dr. Loren Yamamoto on the effectiveness of chest compressions by smaller rescuers which was accepted for a poster at Pediatric Academic Society, American College of Emergency Physicians, as well as the American Heart Association Symposium.

Dr. Barry Mizuo participated in the Training in Health care Improvement Course (Dr. Shilpa Patel is a core faculty member) and examined the role of procalcitonin in determining the need and duration of antibiotic therapy in pediatric patients with pneumonia.

Drs. Anna-Lena Lueker and Maya Maxym continue to lead the Global Health Program, coordinating efforts and obtaining funding to assist with sending residents on electives to Laos and American Samoa. Additionally, they have developed a Pediatric ECHO tele-education program geared towards providing primary care providers in resource limited areas, including those on the neighboring Hawaiian Islands and the greater Pacific region, and who do not have immediate access to subspecialist consultation, with knowledge and skills to manage their patients. Their goal is to decrease the costs and delays in care associated with the need for referrals and transfers to subspecialist care. They conduct these sessions monthly on a wide variety of pediatric topics.

Dr. Cheryl Okado has an interest in antibiotic stewardship and is often looked to by members of our division for antibiotic advice. Dr. Okado conducted a study in which she analyzed the susceptibilities of the organisms of skin and soft tissue infections that our pediatric patients were admitted with. With this data, she found that with increasing rates of group A strep to clindamycin, clindamycin monotherapy would not be the best empiric coverage for these patients and that the addition of cephalexin would be important. This research changed our division's management of skin and soft tissue infections.

Dr. Marissa Fakaosita is conducting a longitudinal study on the management of bronchiolitis in the hospital setting. She is specifically examining the role of heated high flow nasal cannula in the hope of preventing ICU admissions for these patients.

Our division has created order sets and clinical care pathways for 11 pediatric conditions including, fever in the neonate, jaundice, skin and soft tissue infections, pneumonia, seizures, asthma, acute gastroenteritis, brief resolved unexplained event (BRUE), osteomyelitis, bronchiolitis and urinary tract infections. These are updated by the division annually, ensuring that any new national guidelines and updates are included. Dr. Selina Chen, with her role in informatics, helps to deploy these pathways.

Advocacy and Service

Drs. Mae Kyono, Kyra Len and Selina Chen were also a part of the Hawai'i Pacific Health mass effort to immunize the citizens of Samoa after a measles outbreak in October 2019. Dr. Kyono and her nurse team were able to immunize 600 patients in a single day!

Faculty and Clinical Faculty

Selina S.P. Chen, MD, MPH is a full-time UH Assistant Professor and serves as JABSOM medical student mentoring program advisor. She serves clinically as a pediatric hospitalist and an internal medicine hospitalist, with additional duties in the Pediatric After Hours Clinic, outpatient clinic, and as a nocturnist at Shriner's Hospital. She splits her time as physician builder and champion for Hawai'i Pacific Health's Medical Informatics. Her research interests in Information System Improvement and Data Analytics includes clinical decision support from evidence based practices and data analytics. For her research interests in Infectious Disease, Cancer, Diabetes, and QI projects, she continues to update Infectious Disease chapters on Medscape including Measles and our department's Case Based Pediatric textbook, for which she is a chapter author and editor for Hem/Onc section.

Diane Ching, MD is a 0.6 FTE UH assistant professor with special interests in medical education and

procedures. Dr. Ching serves as the medical student inpatient rotation director and plays an active role on the PEDS committee. She also serves as a medical student preceptor and facilitates various medical school education sessions such as simulation sessions and sessions to improve patient care. She is also the pediatric hospitalist representative for the Radiology SOE committee. Finally, together with colleagues from Pediatric Neurology, Dr. Ching has also been working to improve seizure management through the development and implementation of the seizure order set and guidelines.

Jennifer Di Rocco, DO, MEd is a 0.8 FTE UH Assistant Professor who splits her time between clinical work as a pediatric hospitalist and her role as an Associate Program Director for the UH Pediatric Residency Program. She co-directs a wards-based teaching rotation for the senior residents, and has a special interest in assisting learners who are struggling and helping pediatric residents prepare for their board examinations. She is the chair of the Clinical Competency Committee and is active in many additional department committees as well as cochairing the Curriculum, Evaluations and Milestones Subcommittee that spans across all of the UH Graduate Medical Education Programs. She helps direct the KMCWC Pediatric Hospital Medicine Journal Club and Case Review Series, a multidisciplinary monthly scholarly CME conference in which our division continues to grow and improve in our use of evidence based medicine and best practices across our systems of patient care. She was honored to have been chosen as a member of the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education Pediatrics Milestones 2.0 National Committee, and has traveled to the ACGME headquarters in Chicago several times in 2019-2020 to meet with other clinician educators from around the country to rewrite improved performance milestones by which pediatric residents are measured.

Marissa Fakaosita, MD is a 0.8 FTE UH Assistant Professor who is also the Individualized Educational Unit (IEU) Coordinator and Recruitment & Selection Co-Chair for the residency program. As the IEU Coordinator, she works with each second and third year resident on creating individualized rotation curriculum experiences to enhance their residency training exposure. Additionally, along with Dr. Kono, is the 4th year Pediatric Wards Sub-I Co-Coordinator, and very much enjoys mentoring medical students who have decided to pursue pediatrics as a career.

In collaboration with nursing and respiratory therapy staff, Dr. Fakaosita is involved in a longitudinal quality improvement project regarding the management of hospitalized children with bronchiolitis. She has presented several teaching lectures and workshops on a variety of topics including medical student boot camps featuring sessions in medical communication skills and resident note writing and documentation. Her interests include medical education and expanding access to, and quality of, healthcare in rural areas of Hawaii. She is a resident faculty adviser and medical student preceptor. She received the Faculty Kaka'o Aloha Teaching Award in June 2020.

Adriana Herrera, MD, MPH is a 0.8FTE UH Assistant Professor and Hospitalist. Her career interests include Global Health, in which she completed a fellowship, as well as medical education.

Tyler Klein, NP, is a nurse practitioner within the pediatric hospitalist who came to us from the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit. She brings with her an interest in the critically ill child and brings with her a great deal of bedside experience and patient care.

Jessica S. Kosut, MD is a 0.8 FTE UH Assistant Professor and continues in her role as the Hospitalist Division Head. Her role allows her the opportunity to oversee the day to day operations of the hospitalist division, work closely with the nursing staff of the inpatient unit, and interface with all of the departments of the hospital in an effort to continue to provide safe and effective care to our patients across their stay in the hospital. Additionally, Dr. Kosut is the Chair of the Pediatric Standards of Excellence Committee, a multidisciplinary committee which takes on numerous projects from supporting nurses in their development of protocols to the introduction of new programs, such as structuring an inpatient rehabilitation program on the inpatient unit to oversight of protocols and order sets. Dr. Kosut sits on several hospital committees, including the Pediatrics Committee and the Pediatrics Peer Review Committee. She is a medical student advisor, an advisor for the medical school Pediatric Interest Group (PIG) and a JABSOM medical student interviewer. She joined the editorial board for the Hawai'i Journal of Health and Social Work, for which she is also a peer reviewer. Finally, she also sits on the medical advisory board for the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

Jordan Kono, MD is a UH clinical assistant professor and full time Hospitalist. Dr. Kono oversees journal club and case review forum for the division and is

taking on committee work both in the residency program as well as in the hospital.

Mae Kyono, MD is a UH Assistant Professor and full time Hospitalist. She devotes additional professional time to her early childhood grant. She is the project child care health consultant advisor for Healthy Child Care Hawai'i, which is a part of the Hawai'i Department of Health. She is vice chair for the Department of Pediatrics at KMCWC. She represents the Hospitalist Division on the KMCWC Community Pediatric and Peer Review Committee. She has been visiting pediatricians in the community to improve the communication and interaction with the division prior to the pandemic. She is an active member of the American Academy of Pediatrics and is on the Hawai'i Chapter of the AAP Board as the immediate past president.

Kyra Len, MD is a full-time UH Assistant Professor and Department of Pediatrics Medical Student Director, whose primary research interest lies in medical education. Her leadership roles also include serving as the Chair of the JABSOM Pediatric Medical Student Curriculum Committee and Longitudinal Clerkship Director for JABSOM. Additionally, this year she took on the new role as Co-Director of the Learning Communities for JABSOM, a new initiative that focuses on training medical students to excel in communication, compassion and connection with their community. She is involved in several medical education, research, and quality improvement projects. Her current research projects includes the MOC4 project for Pediatric Preceptors and recent publications about the 4th year medical student boot camp and wellness curriculum in the Pediatric clerkship. She is the JABSOM junior faculty representative for the Council of Faculty and Academic Societies with the AAMC and is a member of the JABSOM Curriculum Committee. She is active in medical student and resident education. She also serves on multiple hospital, department and medical school committees. She is also a resident advisor, faculty advisor for the Pediatric Interest Group and serves as an advisor for students interested in a career in Pediatrics.

James Lin, MD is a full time UH Assistant Professor who is board certified in both Pediatrics and Clinical Informatics. He divides his time between clinical work as a Pediatric Hospitalist and his role as Vice President of Information Technology for Hawai'i Pacific Health, where

he focuses on information system improvement to improve health care delivery. Initiatives include telehealth implementation, optimizing information systems and improving usability of technology in health care. Hawai'i Pacific Health is a HIMSS Stage 7 level hospital and clinic system and a three time Davies Award winner for use of health IT in patient care delivery.

Anna-Lena Lueker, MD is a 0.65 FTE pediatric hospitalist and a recent graduate of the OME fellowship in medical education under Dr. Richard Kasuva at UH JABSOM. She is an Assistant Clinical Professor of Pediatrics and her focus in this capacity includes medical education and global health. She acts as co-director for the Resource Resident/Resident Educator Rotation for the UH Pediatric Residency Program with Dr. Jennifer Di Rocco, is responsible for the resident wards evaluations, sits on the KMS Continuing Medical Education committee, and acts as advisor to a pediatric resident. She is co-director of the Global Health Rotation for pediatric residents alongside Dr. Maya Maxym, and has traveled to American Samoa to precept third year residents rotating at LBJ Tropical Medical Center. She is also co-creator and co-medical director for the Pediatric ECHO with Dr. Maxym, which offers tele-education aimed at providing primary care providers in resource limited settings without immediate access to subspecialist consultation with the tools to better care for complex pediatric patients. As part of the pediatric hospitalist group, she also sits on the Utilization Management Committee, the Pediatric Sepsis Committee, and leads the task force responsible for the division's guideline and order set for the inpatient management of asthma. Dr. Lueker is currently finalizing a project to update the hospital-wide PEWS policy which aims to provide early identification of pediatric patients at risk for clinical decompensation.

Maya Maxym, MD, PhD is a UH Assistant Professor and 0.8 FTE Pediatric Hospitalist. She is the Co-Director (with Dr. Lueker) of Global Health for the Pediatric Residency Program and is currently working on developing and expanding Global Health opportunities, including didactic sessions and away rotations, for the pediatric residents. She is also working with interested faculty from other departments to enhance Global Health education at JABSOM, has organized several successful inter-residency Academic Half Day sessions on Global Health and Social Justice, and sits on the UH Mānoa Work Group for Global Health and Social Justice. She and Dr. Lueker jointly

started the first Pediatric ECHO in Hawai'i, which has been providing free, relevant tele-education to pediatric physicians and advanced practice providers throughout the state and beyond since May, 2019. With Dr. Marissa Fakaosita, she recently helped to found the Pediatric Department Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Work Group. She serves as a medical student and resident advisor and has presented various lectures and small group teaching sessions to JABSOM medical students during the clinical and pre-clinical years. She represents the division on the Revenue Cycle and EID Committees and is also responsible for the division's guideline and order set for hyperbilirubinemia.

Barry Mizuo, MD is a full-time UH Assistant Professor and the Department of Pediatrics Medical Student Clerkship Director. He enjoys working closely with medical students and sits on the Department of Pediatrics medical student curriculum committee and JABSOM's Clerkship Education Committee (CEC). He has served as a Problem- Based Learning (PBL) cotutor and a faculty advisor for the medical school's Pediatric Interest Group. Dr. Mizuo's teaching interests include simulation education where he serves on the Department of Pediatrics simulation task force committee, helps coordinate the 3rd year medical student simulation experience while on Pediatrics, and continues to provide 4th year medical students simulation experience in performing lumbar punctures. Along with Dr. Kyra Len, he helped develop an ongoing MOC Part 4 project to help enhance the teaching skills of pediatric preceptors, as well as award them MOC Part 4 credit for their participation in the project. Dr. Mizuo expanded his research endeavors participating in the 2020 Hawai'i Pacific Health Summer Student Research Program where he continued his investigation of procalcitonin usage to help limit unnecessary antibiotic administration in admitted pediatric pneumonia patients with the help of a assigned undergraduate researcher.

Cheryl Okado, MD is an Assistant Professor and full time hospitalist. She is the Vice-chair of the Pharmacy and Therapeutic committee and a member of the Infection Control, Maintenance of Certification, and Simulation Task Force committees. She serves as a Problem-Based Learning tutor for medical students, facilitates courses for handoff training and simulation training. She is Vice-President of the Hawai'i chapter of the Society of Hospital Medicine.

Shilpa J. Patel, MD is an Associate Professor of Pediatrics at UH. She works part time clinically as a Pediatric Hospitalist, and devotes most of her time to patient safety efforts. She is a resident advisor, a clerkship preceptor and a mentor for JABSOM students working on quality improvement/patient safety QIPS projects. She is an active member of the KMCWC Maintenance of Certification (MOC) committee and of Department of Pediatrics governance and leadership councils. She is Chair of the KMCWC Alapono committee, which reports quality improvement and patient safety (QI/PS) topics to the KMCWC Board of Directors. As Physician Liaison to the Hawai'i Pacific Health (HPH) Quality and Safety department, she leads HPH and KMCWC efforts on various topics. She is a core organizer and instructor of the inter-professional HPH Training for Healthcare Improvement program in OI/PS. She is active with national OIPS collaborative. the I-PASS Study Group, and is a Society for Pediatric Research member. She is the project lead for the implementation of the national I-PASS SCORE project, which is a PCORI-funded project to bring structured communication to family centered rounds at 21 diverse hospitals, in order to reduce harmful errors.

Gina V. Ramirez, MD is a full-time faculty hospitalist and an assistant professor of pediatrics. She is newly board certified in Pediatric Hospitalist Medicine, in addition to General Pediatrics. She serves on the Advanced Care Planning Committee and Trauma Team Committee. She enjoys precepting medical students and teaching residents. She is tasked with updating the diabetes and asthma guidelines and order sets for the division.

William Shea, MD is a full time UH assistant professor and serves half-time as a pediatric hospitalist and half-time as an internal medicine hospitalist. His research interests include clinical outcomes research in both the general pediatric and general internal medicine realms, as well as quality improvement projects. He is currently involved in the Surgical Unit-Based Safety Program (SUSP) on the adult inpatient side to reduce the rate of surgical site infections. Additionally, Dr. Shea has an interest in fever in the neonate and gives an excellent lecture to the residents on the workup of these patients and keeps this inpatient guideline and order set updated.

Tiffany Wang, MD is a 0.8 FTE UH Assistant Professor and resident ward rotation director, serving as the liaison between residents and the hospitalist division and helping to shape the wards rotation curriculum. She is a

member of the Pediatric Standards of Excellence Committee, HHP Pediatric Subspecialty Committee, Program Evaluation Committee, and Clinical Competency Committee, and represents the division in the EPIC pediatric work group. She oversees the direct observations of resident history and physicals by the hospitals and has been a third year medical student preceptor since 2015. She also helps with facilitating IPASS training for MS3s and leading an annual bootcamp on communication for 4th year medical students who are pursuing a career in pediatrics. She is interested in medical student and resident education, as well as quality improvement.

The Pediatric Intensive Care is a 14-bed acute care unit with the capacity to open an additional 4 to 6 beds for intermediate level care patients. Patients are all cared for in private rooms, and families have sufficient space to stay with their children during their PICU stay.

We admit approximately 600 children per year with a vast array of medical and surgical problems, ranging from sepsis to congenital heart disease, and respiratory failure. Patients from all over the Pacific are transported to the Kapi'olani PICU, and we have an active, well-trained, transport team. In addition to caring for patients at Kapi'olani, our physicians assist in the care of critically ill children at Queen's Medical Center, and Kaiser Moanalua Medical Center. We are also involved in the care of Medically Fragile children throughout the State.

The PICU team provides complex care to the critically ill patients in our PICU. Continuous renal replacement therapy, plasmapheresis, high-frequency ventilation, and nitric oxide therapy are among the therapies available to our patients. The Hanuola ECMO program has successfully treated many neonatal and pediatric patients since 2007. In 2010, our program was recognized as a Center of Excellence for this type of life support. In September of 2017, ELSO, the national ECMO organization, increased our designation to Gold Level. August 1995, saw the start of "Heart Week." Additonally, 5 times a year for over 20 years, during "Cardiac Week", open-heart surgical patients and select interventional cardiac catheterization patients receiving post-procedural care in the PICU

The pediatric trauma collaborative care agreement between the Kapi'olani PICU and the Surgical/Neuro Intensive Care Unit at Queen's Medical Center has been very successful. PICU physicians have been

Providing consultative assistance in the management of pediatric trauma patients hospitalized at Queen's Medical Center. With the continued development of Kapi'olani's own trauma service, we have seen more patients being admitted to the PICU for their acute care.

At Kaiser Moanalua, the Kapi'olani PICU physician group provides critical care coverage in the Kaiser PICU several days a month. In addition to the management of critically ill patients, we provide inpatient procedural sedation services.

Community services include assisting in the medical care of Medically Fragile Children in the community. Members of the PICU staff play an integral role in returning many Medically Fragile Children to their homes, and help provide the medical support necessary to keep them there. We also maintain a close working relationship with the medical staff at Kulana Malama, the Pediatric Nursing Facility in Ewa. We have collaborated in the transitioning of care of Medically Fragile children from the acute setting in the PICU, to the convalescent setting at Kulana Malama.

The Division is active in Quality Improvement and Investigator Initiated research. There is active participation in the medical student and pediatric residency education with several members in leadership position in the various residency related committees.

The members in the Division spend most of their free time with their families and enjoy various outdoor activities that are available in the State.

Many of our division members are active in quality improvement and clinical research activities, which often include medical students and residents. A few of the specialists are in private practice and the majority are employed by Hawai'i Pacific Health Medical Group (HPHMG). As a group, we continue to work on strategies to improve care and collaboration for patients across our specialties as well as within the primary care and hospital settings.

Pediatric Specialty clinics are held at the Kapi'olani office building and the Hale Pawa'a building. Some division members also provide care at other Hawai'i Pacific Health facilities, Kaiser facilities, and neighbor island outreach clinics. Clinical services in all specialties have expanded to include telemedicine services as well.

Our division continues its path of growth; this past year we welcomed Rachel Coel, MD, in Sports Medicine, Makana Prothero, APRN, in Infectious Disease, and Melissa Yamauchi, MD, in Cardiology.

Pediatric Cardiology

Dr. Dowsett serves

Medical Genetics is offered as an elective for preclinical students in MD5, MS3 students during the Pediatric Clerkship, MS4 students, Pediatric residents, Ob/Gyn residents, and MFM fellows. We also provide learning opportunities for genetic counseling students and community learners.

Pediatric Infectious Diseases

The Section of Infectious Diseases is very active both clinically and in research. Led by Dr. Marian E. Melish, who has been in this Department for more than 40 years, the members support a very active clinical service, which includes both inpatient and outpatient services and also provide significant support to the community in the form of telephone consultations. From an organizational perspective, the membership also supports the Infection Control and Prevention Department of Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women and Children including preparedness for New and Emerging Infectious Diseases. The elective in infectious diseases is a highly sought rotation amongst both medical students and residents, as the clinical cases span not only all of Hawai'i but also the entire Pacific Basin. The members also coordinate three annual grand rounds for the Department of Pediatrics and numerous ID case conferences throughout the year.

Natascha Ching, MD, is an Assistant Professor in the Department. Dr. Ching received her medical degree from the University of Hawai'i, John A. Burns School of Medicine. She completed her pediatric residency at The New York Presbyterian Hospital – Cornell in New York. She pursued subspecialty fellowship training in Pediatric Infectious Diseases at Mattel Children's Hospital at University of California, Los Angeles. After fellowship, she joined the faculty of UCLA for 7 years where she served on the clinical ID consultation services and performed research in Pediatric Immunocompromised transplant patients. She then practiced Pediatric Infectious Diseases as an ID consultant in a subspecialty group practice and Dell Children's Medical Center in Austin, Texas for 4 years. She has relocated home in November 2014 to practice Pediatric Infectious Diseases at KMCWC. In addition to her clinical activities, she leads the efforts on the Pediatric antibiotic stewardship program at KMCWC

and the Pediatric Department's Taskforce on Careers in Medicine to encourage high school and college students to pursue careers in medicine with an emphasis in Pediatrics. She is actively working on research involving acute infections, their diagnosis and management with multitude of college students, medical students and pediatric residents. She is on the Infection Control and Prevention Committee and the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committees for the hospital. Dr. Ching has continued to organize the yearly Aloha Pediatric Infectious Diseases Conference started by Infectious Diseases colleague and former Chairman Dr. Rudoy to provide Pediatric Infectious Diseases knowledge to our community clinicians.

Marian E. Melish, MD, is a tenured Professor in the Department. In addition to being a very astute physician supporting the clinical activities of the section, she is also very active in research and her current active research projects include studies in Kawasaki Disease and eosinophilc meningitis or neuroangiostrongyliasis caused by the rat lungworm (*Anglylostrongylus cantonensis*). She is also a world renowned expert of staphylococcal diseases. Dr. Melish is head of Infection Control and Prevention at the KMCWC.

Sarah Park, MD, is a Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department. She is the Hawaii State Epidemiologist and has been active in this role with the evaluation and control of the vaccine-preventable infectious diseases in the State.

Bryscen "Makana" Prothero, APRN, is a board certified Pediatric Nurse Practitioner who joined Hawaii Pacific Health in November of 2018. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Biology from the University of Nevada Las Vegas and returned home to Hawai'i to obtain his Masters of Science degree in Nursing at the University of Hawai'i Manoa. Pediatric Nephrology

Susan Ingraham, MD, PhD, joined the division of Pediatric Nephrology in September 2016. Previously, she was an attending nephrologist and NIH-funded investigator at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. She provides both inpatient and outpatient consultations in all areas of pediatric nephrology, and enjoys traveling from Oahu to the neighbor islands. Her particular areas of expertise are obstructive nephropathy and congenital anomalies of the kidney and urinary tract. Other interests she hopes to pursue at KMCWC and JABSOM include resident education and collaborative clinical research.

Rhiana Lau, MD, is an Assistant Professor of Pediatrics and the Division Chief of the Pediatric Specialty Division. She attended medical school at the University of Minnesota. She returned to Hawai'i after completing her pediatric residency and pediatric nephrology fellowship training at UCLA. She enjoys working with both the residents and medical students rotating at KMCWC and on the pediatric nephrology rotation. In addition to clinical interests in acute kidney injury, obesity-related hypertension, and improving patient compliance, she also has an interest in quality improvement and expansion of telehealth capabilities.

James E. Musgrave, MD, is a Professor of Pediatrics, he is partially retired. Dr. Musgrave's research interests involve drug trials in pediatric patients with hypertension and epidemiology of pediatric nephrology problems in Hawai'i. He remains active in the medical school teaching program providing seminars and lectures.

Collectively, the pediatric nephrology service offers consultative services at KMCWC and other hospitals, nephrology clinic at the Hale Pawa'a office, and neighbor island outreach clinics.

A Pediatric Nephrology rotation is offered to Pediatric residents. A combined nephrology and rheumatology elective is offered to Pediatric residents and MS4 students. MS3 students have the opportunity to shadow in clinic on their outpatient pediatric rotation.

Pediatric Neurology

Keith Abe, MD, is an Assistant Professor of Pediatrics and provides inpatient and outpatient neurology consultation services. He completed medical school and Pediatrics residency training at JABSOM and returned to Hawai'i after completing his child neurology training at Stanford University. He is board certified in pediatrics, neurology with special

qualifications in child neurology, and epilepsy. Dr. Abe's clinical interests include seizures and epilepsy, encephalitis, demyelinating disease, pediatric stroke and neurogenetic disorders. Dr. Abe provides teaching for residents, medical students, and premedical students and serves on the physician advisory board for the Epilepsy Foundation of Hawaii and the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

Irisa Devine, MD, joined the neurology group in 2019 and is an Assistant Professor of Pediatrics where she provides outpatient neurology consultation services. Dr. Devine completed her medical school training at the University of Wisconsin and pediatric neurology residency at Mayo Clinic Jacksonville. She completed fellowship a in Neurophysiology/EMG at Mayo Clinic Jacksonville. She is board certified in neurology with special qualifications in child neurology and clinical neurophysiology and electrodiagnostic medicine. Dr. Devine provides teaching for residents and medical students. Her clinical interests include pediatric EMG/nerve conduction studies and neuromuscular diseases (e.g., muscular dystrophies, hereditary neuropathies, spinal muscular atrophy, myasthenia gravis, myopathies). Her clinical interests include headache, ADHD and pre and post neurosurgery procedures. His research has shifted from autoantibody work in rheumatic fever to research in graduate medical education. He is working on manuscripts in resident research and career choices, which was helped by his directorship of the pediatric resident research program for the Department of Pediatrics. He has a team of pre-medical undergraduates helping with these projects, of which he provides direction, mentorship, and experience for them in and writing medical manuscripts publication. Aloha and welcome to the Research Webpage of the University of Hawaii Pediatric Residency Program. Thank you for your interest in research and in our program. We would like to introduce ourselves and provide you with both the research expectations and resources at our program. Both the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) and the American Board of Pediatrics (ABP) encourages resident research activities, but they do not mandate it. However, some scholarly activity is one of the graduation requirements. The expected research work spans over a various levels based on each resident's specific interests and post-residency goals. Any one of the following would meet the scholarly activity expectation for graduation.

1) Become a part of an ongoing prospective trial or a retrospective cohort analysis

Your research mentor can support your contribution enough for your graduation with or without offering you a co-authorship.

2) Initiate your own prospective trial or a chart review project

- 3) Obtaining an Institutional Review Board (IRB) approval for any research project IRB approval itself would help you qualify for graduation requirement from scholarly activity standpoint.
- 4) Grant/funding approval a. This remains a huge challenge in the world of research in any field even for senior researchers with the plethora of grants and publications. We don't expect a resident to get funding approved. However, if you can, it will be considered a highly respectable scholarly activity.

5) Case report (publication is encouraged but not mandatory)

Working with your research mentor on an interesting case with appropriate literature review, manuscript preparation and a presentation on Raul Rudoy Research Day is required.

6) Any Quality Improvement (QI) or an Advocacy Project

To help support our research program, residents have regular support from our Research Team. A team is consistent of faculty members actively involved in research and enthusiastic to support residents in their scholarly activity. The Research Team meets with residents quarterly with specific goals and objectives intended to insure each resident has the resources, tools, and support to meet the scholarly activity expectations of the program.

The Research Team, along with the leadership of Dr. Loren Yamamoto, also assists with the Residents' Journal Club. Residents work with a member of the Research Team to select articles for journal club and the faculty members also participate in active discussion during the actual presentation.

Our team is comprised of faculty members and staff who are enthusiastic to support residents in their scholarly activities. Feel free to reach out to any of us with your research related questions.

Global Health Initiatives / Activities in the Residency Program

Drs. Anna-Lena Lueker and Maya Maxym co-direct the Global Health (GH) initiatives for the Department of Pediatrics and the Pediatric Residency Program. Activities are focused on creating a variety of educational opportunities for students and residents, as well as coordinating away rotations for third year residents. With the exception of 2020, the Pediatric Residency Program has been sending between 1-3 senior residents to American Samoa for a 2-4 week rotation at LBJ Tropical Medical Center for the past five years. During this rotation, residents have the opportunity to practice full-scope general pediatrics, including attending deliveries, consulting in the ER, and following their own patients from admission to discharge.

Our team hopes that the rotation in American Samoa will be possible in 2021 and is in the process of recruiting faculty members who are interested in precepting residents and sharing their expertise with colleagues at LBJ. In addition, we continue to explore other options for Global Health electives for our residents and have created a formula curriculum for predeparture training and post-return debrief that follows best practices laid out by the ABP, CUGH, and others. Over the past several years, we have established a durable and mutually beneficial relationship with our colleagues at LBJ and have provided assistance coordinating care for several individual patients who require treatment in Hawaii.

We have also continued the popular, twice yearly, multidisciplinary, inter-residency Academic Half Day sessions. Our most recent session was dedicated to the intersection of Human and Planetary Health. Members of the Department of Pediatrics also participate in several university-wide GH committees and activities.

Drs. Lueker and Maxym have co-directed Hawaii's first pediatric ECHO tele-education program since 2019 and recently received funding from the DOH to dedicate a series to the ways in which the COVID pandemic continues to affect children, families, and healthcare providers. Pediatric ECHO Hawaii makes subspecialist expertise available to primary care providers and others in the community, including on the neighbor islands and throughout the Pacific, with the goal of improving patient care and decreasing unnecessary transfers and referrals.

Fellowship Training in Neonatal Perinatal Medicine Jointly Sponsored by UH JABSOM & Tripler Army Medical Center

Program Overview:

This training program has two training locations; at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children (KMCWC) and Tripler Army Medical Center (TAMC). In its current format, this program has been in existence for 33 years and has trained 43 Fellows (37 Military and 6 Civilian). The goal of the program is to train fellows in an environment of inquiry and prepare them for a successful career in both clinical and academic practice in a wide variety of settings including a diverse population. Given that both the facilities get transfers from the Pacific Basin, the exposure to a wide spectrum of clinical conditions is a major strength of the program. In January 2020, the program successfully completed a ACGME site visit and was fully accredited for 10 years with annual submission of updates.



The training program devotes 15 months to clinical time including electives in Maternal Fetal Medicine and Cardiology. The rest of the time is devoted to basic science and clinical research, including Quality Improvement projects. Research facilities include access to Department of Clinical Investigations, Tripler Army Medical Center, and various basic researchers within the University of Hawaiʻi at Manoa, John A. Burns School of Medicine system.

Update for the Year:

Dr. Lauren Staiger, MD continues her program is now in the second year of her training. Drs. Min Hwang and Dr. William Sherman passed their Neonatal Perinatal Boards in 2020. Congratulations. Drs. Stephanie Eighmy and Matthew Harrell will join the staff at Tripler starting summer of 2020 while Dr. Melanie Jacobson joined the group at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women and Children.

Recruitment:

The program is open to applications from prospective trainees in both the military and the civilian population. Given the logistics of this combined application process, currently the program does not participate in ERAS. Military applications are submitted to the Ministry of Defense and the civilian applications are submitted directly to the training program.


Maintenance of Certification Part 4, American Board of Pediatrics Pediatric Department Update Lynn Iwamoto, Associate Professor

All physicians who are board-certified under the American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS) maintain their board certification by meeting requirements in four areas: professional standing, lifelong learning, cognitive expertise, and improving professional practice. Practice improvement, also known as Part 4 MOC, is focused on participation in quality improvement efforts. Recognizing that quality and practice improvement is integral to and already a part of physician practice, Hawai'i Pacific Health and Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children have been portfolio sponsors for Maintenance of Certification (MOC) quality improvement (QI) projects under the American Board of Pediatrics (ABP) since 2014 and the ABMS since 2016 for multispecialty projects. The KMCWC MOC committee reviews and approves projects to meet ABP standards for QI projects so that physicians can be credited for the quality improvement work that they are doing in every day practice. The committee also works with individual physicians, groups, and trainees to develop ideas, coach project development, and assist with application submission.

In total we have had 22 projects from which 187 physicians have been credited for MOC part 4 points. For the 2019- 2020 academic year, we had 13 active projects and gave credit to 33 physicians. There was one new project approved this year that aims to improve medical student engagement in Pediatrics by improving access to resources during the clerkship. All board certified pediatricians were given part 2 and part 4 credit in recognition of the work that all pediatricians have been doing to learn about the sars-cov-2 virus and the COVID pandemic in order to improve care for their patients.

The committee members are Bridget Allard DO, Rhiana Lau MD, Kristyn Nishimoto MD, Cheryl Okado MD, Shilpa Patel MD, Loren Yamamoto MD, Susan Price MD (Geriatrics), Steven Situ MD (Internal Medicine) and Lynn Iwamoto MD. The committee also serves to facilitate communication from the ABP regarding changes in the certification process. We continue to seek out new members as well as encourage new project ideas.

The Department of Pediatrics in partnership with Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center and Hawaii Pacific Health Research Institute/Kapiolani Medical Center for Women and Children received an NIH grant (UG10D024948) that focuses on building the infrastructure to make available clinical trials for infants, children and adolescents in Hawaii (Hawaii IDeA Center for Pediatric and Adolescent Clinical Trials, HIPACT) for four years. In 2019, the grant, HIPACT², was refunded for an additional five years.

Progress Report of HIPACT and HIPACT²

HIPACT is funded by the National Institutes of Health Office of the Director as part of the IDeA States Pediatric Clinical Trials Network (ISPCTN). The principal objective of HIPACT is to establish a pediatric clinical trials team in Hawai'i to participate in community valued, and scientifically valid multi-center clinical trials, as an ISPCTN partner. The overarching goal is to improve the health and wellbeing of the diverse multiethnic populations of Hawai'i. As the western most IDeA-eligible state, Hawai'i is home to large populations of diverse rural and underserved populations, including indigenous Hawaiian communities, and immigrant populations of Pacific Islanders and Asians. The community-based University of Hawai'i at Manoa (UH Manoa) John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM) Department of Pediatrics (DOP) will serve as the home for HIPACT with an innovative fusion of local and national entities included as partners. Locally, our partners are the Hawai'i Pacific Health (HPH) owned regional perinatal medical center - Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children (KMCWC) and the HPH Research Institute (HPHRI) and the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center (WCCHC) that largely serves Native Hawaiians and Other Pacific Islanders. Through ISPCTN, HIPACT faculty will also have opportunities to participate in professional development activities for clinical trials experiences.

Specific Aims:

- 1. To launch and implement pediatric clinical trials as an ISPCTN site by providing an experienced, coordinated, and a committed team of pediatric-trained personnel.

Junior Faculty Professional Development

- Dr. Easa is the Senior Faculty Development Leader for HIPACT². He worked with the current editor of the Hawaii Journal of Health and Social Welfare (HJHSW) so that pediatric faculty including HIPACT² junior faculty can be involved in the journal's editorial leadership. Two junior pediatric faculty members and two senior faculty members engaged the journal as Assistant/Associate Editor teams to review and vet assigned manuscripts from the HJHSW office. The editorial board has a more comprehensive role at the HJHSW than other journals, and they not only evaluate manuscripts and the peer reviewed comments that are sought and completed, but also in recommending and making specific editorial refinements. Thus, the partnership of Senior/Junior Pediatric faculty membership in this editorial process has been a valuable opportunity for junior faculty members to learn writing and editing skills as well as by adding an important editorial accomplishment to their academic credentials. In addition, it is hoped that through his process, pediatric faculty involved in the journal will act as emissaries to increase journal submission from the faculty of the Department of Pediatrics. Finally, one of the teams created in this process are two HIPACT2 faculty, David Easa as Associate Editor and Jessica Kosut as Assistant Editor.




