Review of Ethical Issues and Oral Communication Focus Designations

The Office of the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at UHM as well as the Mānoa General Education Committee have again reviewed the Mānoa General Education Hallmarks limiting the Focus designations of Contemporary Ethical Issues (E) and Oral Communication (O) to classes numbered 300 and above. This limitation was intended to increase the likelihood that students would satisfy their E and O requirements within their majors, thus exposing students to ethical concerns and oral communication demands they would face in their chosen careers. In addition, limiting these focus requirements to classes numbered 300 and above had the added benefit of satisfying WASC's expectations that General Education requirements be distributed across a student's academic career.

All data indicate that our pedagogical intentions for the E and O courses have been a resounding success. As of Spring 2005, we have over 80 sections of upper-division E courses and 80 sections of upper-division O courses. More important, these classes are distributed across about 40 academic majors, as intended.

Student feedback regarding their E and O experience has been strongly positive. Eighty-six percent of students surveyed in O courses agreed or strongly agreed with the statement: *I feel more comfortable to meet the oral demands of my proposed profession/career*. Similarly 90% of students surveyed in E classes agreed or strongly agreed with the statement: *I feel more competent to evaluate ethical issues in my major*.

Examples of student comments include: "[The O Focus requirement] is a great idea because it provides experiences to prepare for the real job" and "I feel this [Biology] course is an excellent way to fulfill the O requirement for Biology or science majors. It allows us to apply our field of knowledge to communicate."

I would also like to point out that the growing spirit of cooperation on articulation issues between campuses has further created a climate that facilitates "transparency" and clarity in transfer issues. There is better understanding of the new GEC requirements system wide, and in this spirit, we feel it is prudent to build on the progress we have made in articulation through the University Council on Articulation and communication between campuses. Towards this end, we are working hard to develop transfer "road maps" for students and we plan to improve our communications with advisors in other UH components.

In conclusion, upper division E and O courses are working well for our students, and we have dramatically expanded our capacity to provide them with these critical classes in their major disciplines. Thus, we plan no changes at this time in our E and O requirements.
