What is a Community Anchor Institution (CAI)

Statutory definition from BEAD NOFO page 11:

The term "community anchor institution" means an entity such as a school, library, health clinic, health center, hospital or other medical provider, public safety entity, institution of higher education, public housing organization, or community support organization that facilitates greater use of broadband service by vulnerable populations, including, but not limited to, low-income individuals, unemployed individuals, children, the incarcerated, and aged individuals. An Eligible Entity may propose to NTIA that additional types of institutions should qualify as CAIs within the entity's territory. If so, the Eligible Entity shall explain why it has determined that the institution or type of institution should be treated as such and affirm that the institution or class of institutions facilitates greater use of broadband service by vulnerable populations, including low-income individuals, unemployed individuals, children, the incarcerated, and aged individuals.

Key NOFO criteria: Must facilitate the greater use of broadband service by vulnerable populations

BEAD Eligible CAI

- 1. Fits within the CAI definition
- 2. Lacks **access*** to 1 Gbps symmetrical speeds (download/upload)

*If the CAI has the infrastructure available to subscribe to 1 Gbps symmetrical speeds, the CAI is not BEAD eligible regardless of what speeds they currently subscribe to. For example, if the CAI can subscribe to 1 Gbps, but can only afford 100 Mbps speeds, the CAI is <u>not</u> BEAD eligible.

What is UH doing

BEAD Initial Proposal Requirement 6

First step is to **identify** the applicable Community Anchor Institutions

Next Steps for UH

- 1. Identify all applicable CAIs
 - a. Utilize publicly available data (e.g. Hawaii GIS Program, government websites, other websites)
 - b. Reach out to appropriate entities (e.g. Department of Education for schools)
- 2. Draft criteria for community support organizations to be included in the CAI list
- 3. Assess internet connectivity needs of CAIs
 - a. Do they lack access to 1Gbps symmetrical speeds?
- 4. Publish the list of eligible CAIs
- Solicit public comment on CAI list and community support organization inclusion criteria

Next Steps for YOU

- 1. Help identify all applicable CAIs (more on how, to be announced)
- 2. Comment on eligible CAI list and criteria when Initial Proposal public comment period is open
 - a. Nov 1 Nov 30 is official public comment period, but drafts may be posted earlier

Next Steps Timeline 2023

Sep

- * Identify all applicable CAIs
- * Draft criteria for community support organizations to be included in the CAI list
- * Assess internet connectivity needs of CAIs

Oct

- * Publish the list of eligible CAIs
- * Initial Proposal public comment period start

Nov - Dec

* Solicit public comment on CAI list and community support organization inclusion criteria

Summary

- 1. CAIs have clearly and not-clearly defined criteria from the NOFO to be included.
