The Twentieth Computers and Writing

Conference will meet in Honolulu, Hawai'i from **June 10–13, 2004**, hosted by the University of Hawai'i Department of Language Arts at Kapi'olani Community College and the Department of English at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

conference theme

The conference theme, Writing in Globalization:

Currents, Waves, Tides, points to the immense but sometimes unrecognized impact of globalization on the cultural, social, linguistic, and institutional contexts in which we work. Many of us in the computers and writing community are incorporating perspectives on globalization into our research and teaching, trying to understand how global systems intersect with our local engagements with information technology, writing instruction, rhetoric, literary studies, distance learning initiatives, and our personal writing practices.

Our focus on the currents, waves, and tides of globalization has also been inspired by the advice offered to virtually every newcomer to Hawai'i: *never turn your back on the ocean*. The waters of the Pacific can be a source of pleasure and excitement, but they can also pose serious dangers. In the tide of globalization, how can we negotiate the currents and ride the waves in ways that are productive for us, our students, and our communities? With this theme, we hope to provide a challenging focus for papers, panels, roundtable discussions, keynote addresses, and informal conversations while preserving the rich diversity of presentation topics that has been a hallmark of the Computers and Writing Conference.

conference program

The conference will include panels, poster sessions, roundtable discussions, and town hall meetings. As in the past, the conference will partner with the Graduate Research Network, the mentoring program, and the Computers and Writing 2004 Online Conference. Attendees will also have the opportunity to visit Hawai'i-based projects and schools that are integrating writing, computing, and community service in innovative ways.
