Dear Board of Regents,

I am strongly opposed to the plan to increase parking rates for employees at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Please do not approve this plan.

Parking at the University should be free for employees, because they should be encouraged to come work at the University. The jobs at UH are typically under paid and under appreciated. On top of everything else, employees are constantly hit up for fees which I believe we shouldn't have to pay. Other employers in the private sector might provide benefits, perks, and other services to employees to show their appreciation and help contribute to a positive work environment where employees feel valued and appreciated. Services like a free or reduced priced lunch, or access to gym facilities, and free parking. The University could potentially do all these things and more, but instead the food on campus is priced like you're at the airport, employees have to pay to access the on campus gym, and parking is now getting even more expensive.

Please do not approve the plan being submitted by Commuter Services. Instead funding for repairs and maintenance should come from a different funding source. The campus as a whole needs to drastically increase the number of parking stalls through the construction of additional parking structures. Again, the funding for new parking structures should come from a different source. At the same time a serious effort must be made to offer classes via distance learning. If at least the classes in the core curriculum were able to be completed online via distance learning this would help decrease the demand for parking stalls on campus.

Employees and Students could be issued free parking passes they can use with their vehicle to get to campus. If there must be a fee charged, it should be a lot less than what it is now, or what's being proposed. Just look at what it costs to park at other UH system campuses : HCC - \$20 / semester, KCC - free, WCC - free, LCC - free, UH Hilo \$15 / semester, UH West Oahu - free. I understand that the Manoa campus has a high demand for parking, but trying to fund millions of dollars of construction projects by increasing parking fees is not the answer. We should be looking at reducing the parking rates at the Manoa campus, not increasing them.

Dear Chair Yuen, Vice-Chair Acoba, and Members of the BOR Committee on Planning and Facilities,

I am writing today to respectfully submit my opposition to the proposed UHM parking rate increases for the following reasons:

1. Comparing parking fees of downtown commercial buildings with UH parking fees is not a feasible argument, in my humble view. The reason for this is that the UH campus rests on ceded land and therefore it does not carry the same financial burden as commercial properties listed in the analysis by SP Plus, including that of lease fees or property taxes.

A more appropriate analysis may be to compare UH parking fees with parking fees for state employees in downtown since State parking lots rest on ceded lands. I researched into this and found the following link: <http://ags.hawaii.gov/automotive-management/parking-control-branch/>. I have also attached the pdf of employee parking rates for state employees as "*Attachment A: Parking Fees for State Employees Statewide*," and underscored the cost of open parking stalls vs. covered reserved or assigned parking stalls. As you will see, the average rate per month for open parking stalls (which is an equivalent to UHM's upper campus parking) is \$30. Covered parking stalls on the other hand range from \$40-60/month. The premium stalls are 'covered,' as one would expect, because open stalls are subjected to the elements. Parking structures also require regular repairs and maintenance and security protection.

2. Next, I attached "*Attachment B: Auditor's Summary of State Parking Revolving Fund*." This report which ended 6/30/17 shows total revenues of \$3.7 million for the entire State of Hawaii (including neighbor islands). Revenues from parking assessments or fees are \$2.5 million. Compare this with \$5.964 M in revenues with the projected expenditures of \$4.82 M, resulting in an estimated balance of \$1.135M for the UHM campus.

3. This led me to research into the so-called expenses, i.e. the rationale to increase parking fees. Please see "*Attachment C: 1/16/18 UH Budget Briefing*," delivered as a Legislative Testimony by the UH and I have marked relevant line items associated with UH parking expenditures for your review. Note the following:

a) **ENOA corporation-shuttle service**- contract for \$714,331.93 for 1/1/17-12/31/17. Note that ENOA does not provide shuttle service during the summer months, winter, or spring breaks so this is a 7 or 8-month contract. The shuttles services primarily benefit non-parking pass holders.

b) **Star Protection** - Parking enforcement and traffic control services-\$1,050,073.40 (7/1/17-6/30/18). Parking enforcement, as I understand it, focuses primarily on lower campus public events, but it appears to have been incorporated into the 'rationale' to increase *employee* parking fees.

4. Finally, please see "*Attachment D: HRS 304A-2005*", University of Hawaii System Special and Revolving Funds; Management passed in 2016.

It states that the BOR shall ensure that:

- 1) *the purposes for which special and revolving funds are expended, encumbered or transferred benefit those upon whom fees and charges are imposed through these funds;*
- 2) *Fees and charges are fair and equitable with respect to the level and quality of services provided to those upon whom fees and charges are imposed.*

In my view, the current proposal for parking fee increases may possibly be in violation of HRS 304A-2005 because the parking fees are not 'fair and equitable with respect to the level and quality of services provided to those whom fees and charges are imposed' nor do 'those who are charged benefit from the fees they pay.' More specifically,

- 1) Employees purchasing upper and lower campus parking passes are not the primary users of shuttle services and therefore should not be subjected to subsidize shuttle riders from the Manoa, Makiki, McCully and Kaimuki areas that are allowed to commute for free at this time, **including non-affiliated UH passengers**. If the UH administration feels the shuttle services from ENOA is necessary to resolve the parking shortages, then the cost of the shuttle should be best be paid from other funding sources such as General Funds or Tuition and Fees Special Funds, as an example.
- 2) Repairs at the parking structure do not directly benefit the upper campus users and this needs to be addressed fairly and equitably with respect to the level and quality of services provided to the payees of such fees, and;
- 3) The Security Enforcement at Diamond Gate, particularly for athletic events, are not expenses generated by employees parking in upper campus parking nor lower campus parking lots and therefore such expenses should be reflected in appropriate parking hikes to the users of these services.

Lastly, I want to bring to the attention of the Committee that the parking fees proposed will be especially difficult for the custodial and civil service staff paid at significantly lower salary levels than the administrators proposing these hikes. Many leave their day jobs at the end of the day to go on to a second job in order to make ends meet. The proposed parking hikes will clearly be a financial challenge for these groups.

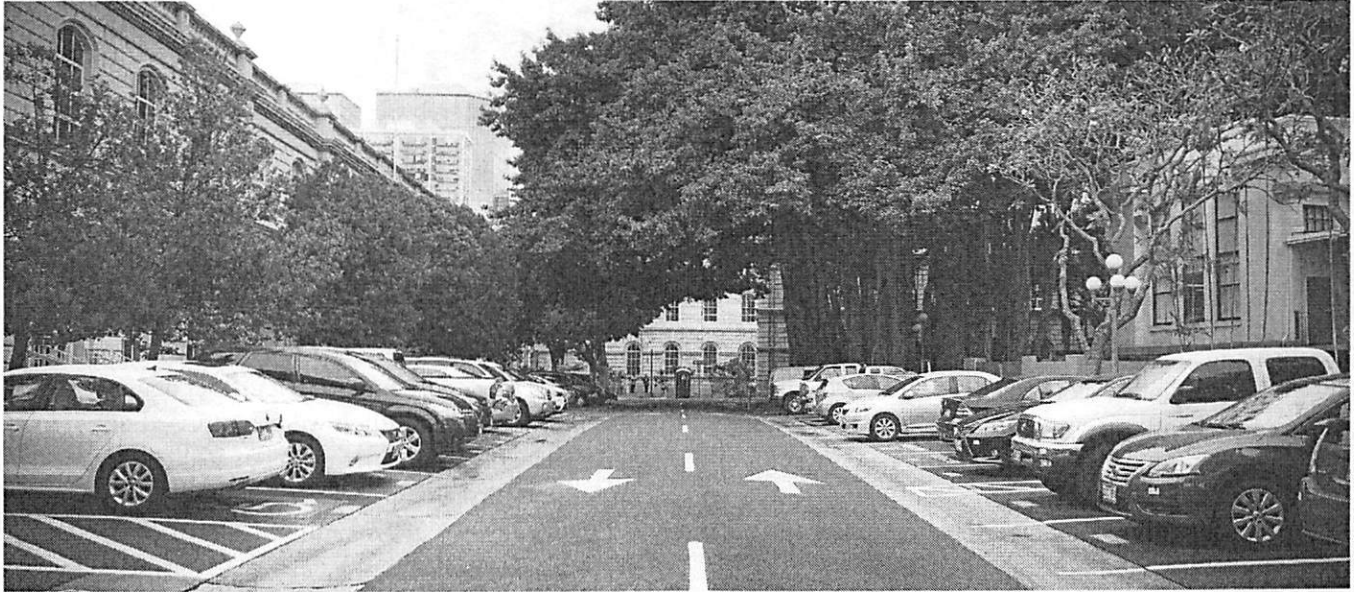

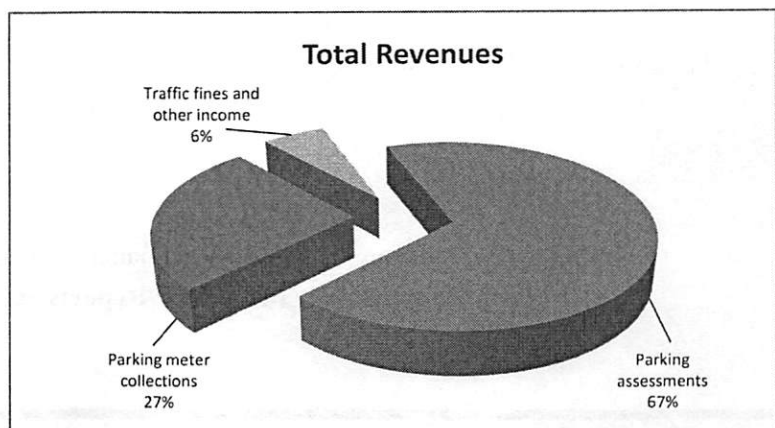
THE PRIMARY PURPOSE of the audit was to form an opinion on the fairness of the presentation of the financial statements for the Department of Accounting and General Services, State Parking Revolving Fund, as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. The audit was conducted by KPMG LLP.

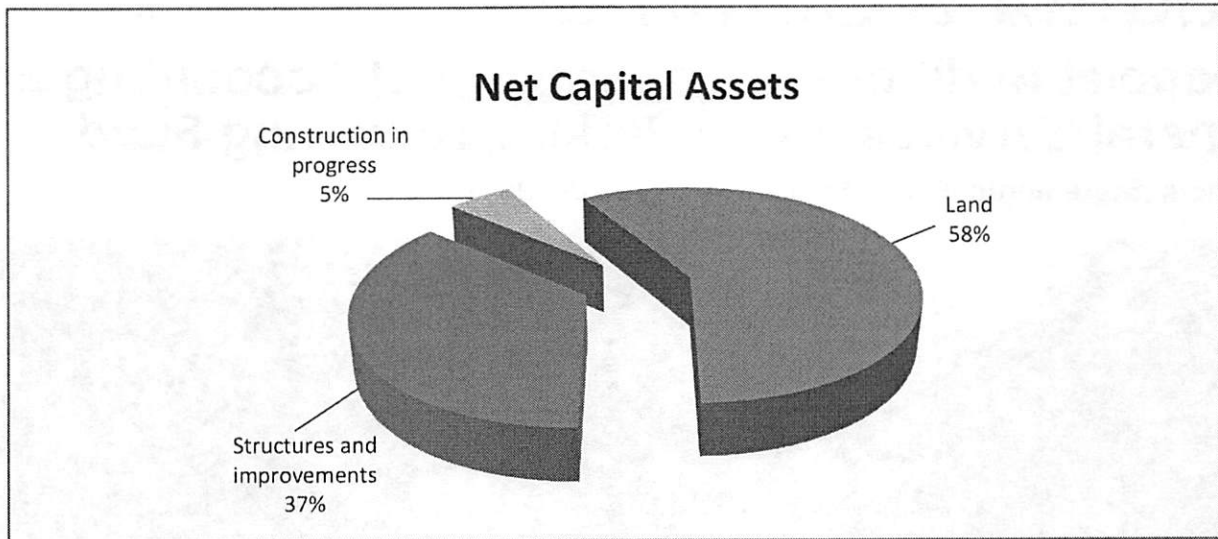
About the Fund

THE STATE PARKING Revolving Fund was established by Act 161, Session Laws of Hawai'i 1963 (Section 107–11, Hawai'i Revised Statutes). The fund is responsible for the assessment and collection of reasonable parking fees, installation of parking meters, and the restriction and control of parking on all State lands within the State Comptroller's jurisdiction. All fees, charges, and other revenue collected are deposited into this fund. Moneys are expended, as necessary, to defray the cost of paving parking areas as well as the purchase and installation of parking meters on State lands within the State Comptroller's jurisdiction.

Financial Highlights

FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ended June 30, 2017, the fund reported total revenues of \$3.7 million and total expenses of \$3.7 million. Total revenues consisted of parking assessments of \$2.5 million, parking meter collections of \$1 million, and traffic fines and other income of \$200,000. Total expenses consisted of depreciation of \$600,000, personnel services of \$1.9 million, repairs and maintenance of \$500,000, and other expenses of \$700,000.





As of June 30, 2017, total assets and deferred outflows of resources exceeded total liabilities and deferred inflows of resources by \$13.2 million. Of this amount, there was an unrestricted net deficit of \$2.7 million. Total assets and deferred outflows of resources of \$18.8 million were comprised of net capital assets of \$15.9 million, cash of \$2 million, and receivables and other assets of \$900,000. Total liabilities and deferred inflows of resources of \$5.6 million were comprised of pension liability of \$2.8 million, net other post-employment benefits other than pensions of \$2.1 million, and accrued and other liabilities of \$700,000.

Capital assets are used to provide parking for employees, contractors with state-related business, and the public. Net capital assets of \$15.9 million consist of land of \$9.3 million, structures and improvements of \$5.8 million, and construction in progress of \$800,000.

Auditors' Opinion

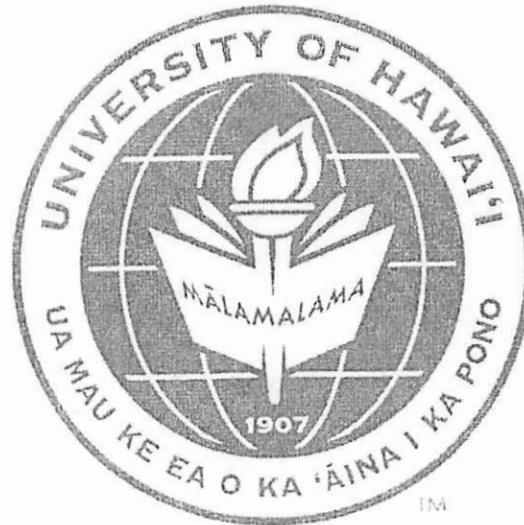

304A. University of Hawaii System

304A-2005 Special and revolving funds; management.

[§304A-2005] Special and revolving funds; management. In managing special and revolving funds under its control, the board of regents shall ensure that:

(1) The purposes for which special and revolving funds are expended, encumbered, or transferred benefit those upon whom fees and charges are imposed through these funds;
and

(2) Fees and charges are fair and equitable with respect to the level and quality of services provided to those upon whom fees and charges are imposed. [L 2006, c 75, pt of §2]

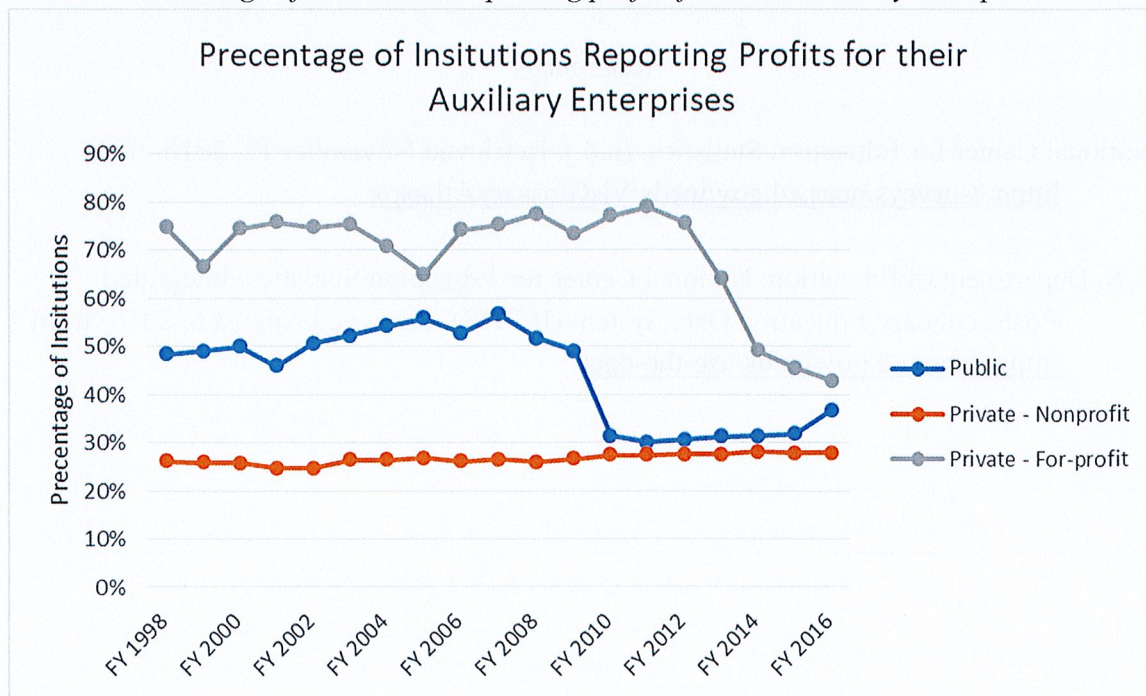

Re: IV.A.1. UH Mānoa Parking Rates

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony regarding the UH Mānoa parking rate increase proposal. My name is Any Lachman and like many on this campus I wear several hats. Relevant to this discussion, I am a customer of Commuter Services, a student in the College of Education, and an employee of Campus Services.

Auxiliary enterprises are defined as "self-supporting operations of the institution that exist to furnish a service to students, faculty, or staff, and that charge a fee that is directly related to, although not necessarily equal to, the cost of the service" (National Center for Education Statistics, n.d.). As self-supporting programs, institutional leadership often may expect these programs to break even or realize a profit that can be redistributed to fund other institutional programs. However, data obtained from the National Center for Education Statistics' Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) shows that less than forty percent (40%) of institutions report profits for their auxiliaries.

Chart 1: Percentage of institutions reporting profits for their auxiliary enterprises.



Auxiliary enterprises derive their revenues mainly from the fees that they charge students, faculty, or staff. Therefore, to maintain this self-supporting status of these programs it is important to increase fees in line with increases of expenditures. If auxiliaries do not maintain their self-supporting status, institutions need to supplement the revenues of auxiliaries with alternative funding. As colleges and universities have limited funding sources, it is unlikely that these budgetary shortfalls could easily be made-up by other sources of funding. Thus, it is important that rates for these services are increased to match rising expenditures for the program.

The University of Hawai'i at Mānoa's Commuter Services faces the same struggles as the generalized auxiliary enterprises discussed previously. The revenues being collected are not sufficient to match the expenditures that need to occur. Without the additional funding that will come from an increase in parking rates, it appears that Commuter Services will not be able to provide the same level of services (e.g., number of stalls, safe parking structures) as required. Thus, unless other sources of funding are available, although it is not something that I am personally looking forward to, it is important that the rate increase be approved.

Dear Board of Regents,

I strongly oppose the proposed parking rate increase. I am a first-generation, low-income college student pursuing a PhD in physics at UH Manoa. As a woman in the most male-dominated field in the academy, I have also lived in poverty twice because of discrimination and harassment (being fired for standing my ground or reporting, both at UH and Columbia University). The proposed fee increase will make the cost of living much more difficult for graduate students, and this of course will be felt most by students who do not have generational wealth and privilege, or who are affected by the gender wealth gap (if not wage gap), or who experience discrimination due to race, etc.

Whenever you consider increasing fees but not wages, realize that you are making graduate education harder for minorities, women, and underrepresented students. Most of my colleagues are white men from wealthy, educated families, and not from Hawaii. The proposed fee increase will only help to insure that the lack of diversity that I experience in my workplace at UH, and the discriminatory attitudes that such an environment fosters, will continue into the future. I hope that the board will prioritize making graduate education diverse and accessible, which can only occur if graduate education is financially feasible. This should be your priority over having an updated parking structure.
