HB671 Relating to Graduate Program Access

Chair Chang, Vice Chair Bertram, and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i supports the intent of HB 671 making an appropriation to the University of Hawai'i for the Graduate Professional Access (GPA) Program and the Health Careers Opportunity Program (HCOP) at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. The University supports HB671 provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact budget priorities indicated in our Board of Regents approved Biennium Budget request.

As the only public institution of higher education in the state, the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa has a special obligation to provide the widest access to all its programs for residents of the state. The University's strategic plan and priorities are consistent with the goals of providing access to academic disciplines at the baccalaureate and graduate level in Science, Technology, Engineering, Math as well as in health careers for students who come from low income backgrounds and are from ethnic communities underrepresented in higher education. Outreach and student support efforts are necessary to improve the recruitment and retention of these students. Both these programs are consistent and support the institutional priorities of UH: 1) increasing the college going rate, transfers from 2 year to 4 year campuses, degree completion for undergraduate, bachelors and graduate programs 2) expanding workforce development initiatives (particularly in STEM and Health Careers) 3) addressing underserved regions and populations of the state (low income communities, Native Hawaiians, Filipinos, Samoans, Southeast Asians, African Americans, Hispanic
