

Testimony Presented Before the
House Committees on Higher Education and Labor and Public Employment

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HB 1013 -- Making an Appropriation for Experiential Learning

Chairs Chang and Sonson, Vice Chairs Berg and Nakasone and Members of the Committees:

My name is Kathy Jaycox, and I am the Interim Executive Director of the Hawai`i P-20 Initiative. I am here to testify in regard to House Bill 1013, which provides funding to the University of Hawai`i to design, research and develop a statewide web-based database of experiential learning opportunities, as well as to conduct a study to identify the barriers which limit the ability/interest of organizations to provide experiential learning opportunities.

I fully support the intent of this bill -- it is consistent with both the mission and the vision of the Hawai`i P-20 Initiative. This bill addresses the needs of employers who wish to offer experiential learning opportunities as well as the needs of educators who seek the support of the business community. I appreciate the fact that the bill allows for a design phase, during which input will be sought from a wide range of stakeholders. This wide range of input will promote the likelihood that the resulting database builds upon existing efforts and minimizes duplication of effort.

I also express the caution that these funds should not replace any funding priorities already established by the Board of Regents within the University's institutional budget.
