## **HB 1800: RELATING TO SMOKING**

Chair Waters, Vice Chair Oshiro and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i strongly opposes House Bill 1800. The bill would amend the Hawai'i Smoke Free Law enacted by the 2006 Legislature, allowing again smoking in bars, nightclubs, and restaurants. The University of Hawai'i is opposed to HB 1800 for the following important health reasons:

- Employees, owners, and patrons would again be subjected to the negative health consequences of second hand smoking.
- HB 1800 would eliminate some of the restrictions of the Hawai'i Smoke-Free Law bill with the negative consequence of increased cigarette consumption and the ensuing negative consequences for health and productivity of smokers.
- HB 1800 would have a negative impact on the State's economy as many non-smokers, representing the vast majority of our citizens, would no longer be enticed to visit establishments that have become smoke-free.

Hawai'i's smoke-free law is fully consistent with the University of Hawai'i's smoke-free campus policy enacted several years prior to Hawai'i's smoke-free law.
