Purpose First Overview

Hawai'i was selected as 1 of 5 states/regions for this 24 month CCA initiative funded by \$1M grant from USA Funds

- Hawaiʻi
- Tennessee
- New Hampshire
- Virginia
- Houston (Texas)

New advising model to integrate career assessment, counseling and labor market data early and continuously - into academic advising to assist students to make a fully informed and deliberate choice of majors and careers.

Infuse career exploration and career development skills into the curriculum and strengthen work-based and service-learning across programs and majors.

What CCA found...

Students with a strong sense of "purpose" that the chosen program of study matches their academic and personal strengths with a clear understanding of future career opportunities are more likely to graduate

Students with a declared major are more likely to graduate (UH four-year campuses: 24.7% vs. 13.6% on-time completion for declared vs. undeclared students at time of entry, Fall 2010 cohort)

Little more than one-third of students reported relying on advising by college counselors, faculty or staff in their selection of a major

Tool for equity - it should expand, not narrow, student aspirations

24 Month Plan

- 1. Meet with campus represenatives regularly
- 2. Inventory career-related tools & practices we already have/use (identify ones that may intersect or we can leverage as a system)
- 3. Implement exploratory majors/meta-majors
- 4. Create assessment for students to identify interest area prior to application
- 5. Provide workforce data to students (Hawai'i Industry Sectors)
- 6. Integrate career and academic advising. Professional development for academic advisors on general career counseling at 2017 AATN Conference
- 7. Identify ways to intergrate career exploration and career development skills into the curriculum



Fewer undeclared students + less major switching

Higher retention and increased completion with fewer excess credits
