The Fate of Neoliberalism in the Age of Trump

Does the rise of Donald Trump represent a new direction of right-wing nationalism for the U.S.? Or are we just seeing more of the same neoliberal policies that have prevailed for decades? This presentation will analyze the rise of Trump and the appeal of right-wing nationalism in a period marked by economic stagnation and increasing inequality and insecurity. It will consider the differences between right-wing nationalism and neoliberalism. Neoliberalism is under serious challenge today, and the dominant policies and institutions are likely to undergo significant change. However, several different directions of change are possible in the coming years.

He is the author of *The Rise and Fall of Neoliberal Capitalism*, Harvard University Press, 2015 (paperback edition 2017), and *Russia's Path from Gorbachev to Putin: The Demise of the Soviet System and the New Russia*, coauthored with Fred Weir, Routledge, 2007. His recent research is on neoliberal capitalism and the rise of right-wing nationalism.
