
Brown Bag Biography Spring 2023 Radical Wahine of Honolulu, 1945

This talk is presented in conjunction with Mari Matsuda's art exhibit at Aupuni Space: Radical Wahine of Honolulu, 1945. The exhibit honors women who were members of various left formations on the UH campus and in the broader Honolulu community, who were red-baited and persecuted for their efforts to bring about true democracy. Matsuda presents a prosographic approach, asking why a cohort of radical women thinkers emerged in Honolulu in 1945. In what ways were these women, who seem singularly astonishing in the depth of their radical thought, perfectly predictable given world events and the realities of their lived experience?
