In 2017 she was hired into the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UHM) President's Office as the inaugural Native Hawaiian Affairs Program Officer, where she implements findings from her award-winning research to advance UHM's goal of becoming a Native Hawaiian place of learning. She is also the director of UHM's Truth, Racial Healing, and Transformation Campus Center and the Institute for Hawaiian Language Research and Translation. She is currently a participant in the inaugural Culture of Health Leadership Institute for Racial Healing. She holds a BA in Hawaiian Studies, an MS in Counseling Psychology, and a PhD in Education Administration.
