SUBJECT: KapCC Foundation Board Portfolio

Per Chancellor Peter Englert's memo dated May 20, 2004, Neal Smatresk's memo dated August 16, 2004, and our discussion on September 7, 2004, we are submitting the appropriate documentations for the joint review and approval of the KapCC Foundation Board by the Multi-campus Foundations Committee.

The following materials and explanation are provided, referencing the six criteria contained in Englert's May 20, 2004, memo:

Criterion 1 – establishment of common foundations requirements for an Associate of Arts degree

- a. KapCC Faculty Senate approved "Revised AA Degree Requirements," which accepted UHM's General Education hallmarks on May 12, 2003 (Appendix 1)
- b. Excerpt of KapCC General Catalog 2003 2005 reflect the new AA Degree requirement (Appendix 2)
- c. Acting President McClain approved changes in KapCC's AA Degree requirement (Appendix 3)
- d. Also, please see Appendix 4 and 5 on establishment and membership on the KapCC Foundations Board.

Criterion 2 – "appropriate University approval of the foundations requirements for an Associate of Arts degree"

Please see Appendices 1, 2 and 3

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Criterion 3 – "appropriate campus foundations – requirements support, including adequate numbers of faculty and support personnel, attention to student needs, and budget"

KapCC Foundations Board is an ad hoc Faculty Senate Committee and thus it receives the following support via the Faculty Senate and Curriculum Committee.

- 1. The Foundations Board chair has received three credits of assigned time for 2004 2005 to coordinate and facilitate the operation of the board and to assist in developing student learning outcomes.
- 2. A full-time APT Educational Specialist provides support for curriculum management, which entails providing support to KapCC's Faculty Senate/Curriculum Committee and therefore, the KapCC Foundations Board.
- 3. KapCC Faculty Senate chair (six credits of assigned time/semester) and Curriculum Committee chair (three credits of assigned time/semester) receive assigned time to oversee and facilitate curriculum and program development procedures and processes.
- 4. In addition, student help funds are allocated to Faculty Senate for clerical support.

We feel that existing resources allocated for curriculum management is adequate for Foundations Board operations.

Criterion 4 – "appropriate course designation and evaluation procedures"

We are currently using UHM curricular forms and procedures for foundations course designation and evaluation.

Our Foundations Board is currently working on operational procedures and processes.

Criteria 5 and 6 – as agreed, will be a collaborative effort of the Foundations Board at HonCC, KapCC and UHM.

Creation of an ad hoc Foundations Board at KCC

The Kapi'olani Community College Faculty Senate met on April 5, 2004 and voted to approve the creation of a Foundations Board at Kapi'olani Community College. The purpose of the Board is to review courses and engage in discussions and planning for articulation in the newly created multi-lateral agreement between UH Manoa, Honolulu Community College (HCC), and Kapi'olani Community College (KCC).

It must be understood that the Foundations Board will be nested in a larger articulation structure at the campus, which will require the creation of other Boards and further delineation and clarifications of roles, responsibilities and lines of communication. As this structure evolves, it is anticipated that changes will be made to the composition and function of the Foundations Board. KCC has established its Foundations Board in advance because HCC and UH Manoa Boards have begun dialogue and planning and we need to become active members in this process as early as April 24, 2004.

The overall goal is to provide a transparent and efficient structure for articulation of courses between the three campuses and work towards the creation of a WI model of articulation. The Foundations Board is largely based on a model created recently by HCC that was endorsed by UH Manoa Foundations Board on March 24, 2004.

KCC Foundations Board

The KCC Foundations Board is established as an ad hoc Faculty Senate committee.

Membership:

- 1. Consists of 7 members, two for each area: Symbolic Reasoning, Written Communication, Global/Multicultural, and 1 representing a non-instructional area.
- 2. Members shall be appointed by the FS.
- 3. Terms shall be for two years.
- 4. The chair and another member of the Board will represent the college in a multi-lateral UH Foundations Committee.

Function:

This board will decide on procedures for reviewing and approving courses based on core hallmarks in the Foundations area. The Faculty Senate (FS) shall approve procedures. Those procedures will become a matter of record in minutes published on the WWW and made available to the campus community. The chair and another member will also engage in discussions with the tri-lateral UH Foundation Committee.

- This board will also create a clear and transparent plan to evaluate the degree of compliance with hallmarks for the courses it has approved, in order to provide continuous feedback to the system Foundations Board to maintain confidence in its approval process. That plan will also be made available to the campus community, and to the system Foundations Board.
- The board will be charged with reporting to the FS, in writing, once each semester as to the courses it has reviewed and approved for Foundations designations. The chair and another member will also report to the tri-lateral UH Foundation Committee.
- All curriculum proposals for new and modified courses will be submitted to the Curriculum Committee. Proposers who wish to obtain a Foundation designation will simultaneously submit the proposal to the Foundation Board. Established courses seeking only a Foundations designation will submit courses directly to the Foundations Board. The Curriculum Committee and the Foundations Board will submit all the recommendations to the FS.

The Faculty Senate of Kapi'olani Community College met on May 9, 2003 and, in separate motions, approved three requests related to the revised AA Degree requirements at the college by the Chairs of the Arts and Sciences Departments.

The Revised AA Degree Requirements

The request to revise the AA Degree requirements formally came before the Senate and was approved after its passage by the Curriculum Committee in the form of a Program Action Request (PAR, number 02CC-370). The PAR and the proposed revisions are attached.

The Senate was in communication and consultation with Assistant Dean Pagotto for the entire Spring semester 2003 regarding the proposed revisions to the AA Degree, which seeks to align Kapi'olani's requirements with the newly revised Gen Ed requirements at Manoa. The Senate tasked the Curriculum and the Academic Standards Committees to review the proposal and to seek departmental feedback. The Senators themselves sought feedback and engaged in serious discussions. The Senate approved the revisions in order to promote our functioning as a seamless system and ease the transfer and movement of UH students within the UH system.

Hallmarks

The Senate's discussion also resulted in the need to adopt UH Manoa's Gen Ed hallmarks. KCC's revised AA Degree proposal uses the language and makes references to "hallmarks". It was deemed necessary that we make it explicit that Manoa's hallmarks are to be adopted by the college. As such, the Senate requested that the Arts and Sciences Chairs make a request to the Senate to that effect. On May 9th, the Senate passed a motion to adopt UH Manoa's hallmarks in relation to the new classification of the revised AA Degree requirements.

Again our approval is rooted in making transfer and articulation easier for students. It also must be emphasized that we do this in anticipation that discussion currently under way regarding the revision of UH articulation policies would create a model in which all UH campuses would collaborate as partners in the future management and adjustment of hallmarks and articulation processes.

KCC Catalog Classification

In an earlier request and in anticipation of the approval of the revised AA Degree requirements, the Arts and Sciences Chairs asked the Faculty Senate to approve the reclassification of courses in the KCC Catalog to reflect the new course designations. Specifically, the request asked that these changes be made without requiring revisions of the existing Course Outline Forms and the processing of them through the Curriculum Committee. The Senate approved the request on May 9, 2003.

The Senate wished to expedite the AA Degree revision and safeguard the interests of students. The approval is granted with the understanding that new courses as well as modifications to and cyclical updating of courses would require the designation of new categories as they process through the Curriculum Committee and the Senate.

Liberal Education Programs

Introduction: The College offers a range of Liberal Education programs to the public in several different ways. Degree and certificate programs prepare students for entry-level positions in the workplace. The College's transfer programs prepare students for transfer to four-year institutions. Also, the college demonstrates its commitment to life-long learning through a series of non-credit offerings aimed at working professionals and alumni.

Degree/Certificate Programs: The four associate degree options are in Exercise and Sport Science, Liberal Arts, New Media Arts, and in a customized Technical-Occupational-Professional degree. Academic Subject Certificates are offered in the areas of Asian Studies and Hawaiian/Pacific Studies. Certificates of Achievement are available in Biotechnician as well as Exercise and Sport Science. Some programs may be completed during evenings and/or weekends. The college often offers groups of courses known as Learning Communities and also may offer courses in a selected focus (such as the Malama Hawai'i series and Access to College Excellence).

Transfer Programs: The College also provides transfer advising and support for students who plan to transfer to baccalaureate institutions such as the University of Hawai'i at Hilo, the University of Hawai'i at Mänoa, the University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu, Chaminade University, or Hawaii Pacific University. General information about transferring is in the Transfer Advising section. For additional information please call the Liberal Arts advising office (734-9500).

Lifelong Learning Credit/Non-Credit Programs: Non-credit short-term liberal arts classes are available to the general public. Classes are available in Performing Arts, Studio Arts and Crafts, Languages, Interpretation, and Senior Programs. These classes are offered through the Non-Credit Registration Office. Liberal Arts Curricula

Associate in Arts Degree (60 Semester Credits)

Program Description: This program is designed to provide students with an Associate in Arts degree and to prepare them for transfer to a baccalaureate degree program at a four-year college or university. Please see an academic advisor for information on current baccalaureate degree requirements at the University of Hawai'i at Mänoa.

A.A. Degree Requirements

Some courses fulfill both the University of Hawai'i at Mänoa and Kapi'olani Community College general education core requirements. Others fulfill only Kapi'olani Community College requirements. Students intending to transfer to UH Mänoa must be careful when selecting courses that satisfy only Kapi'olani Community College requirements. Students should note that baccalaureate degree requirements vary at UH Mänoa and should see their academic advisor for program details. As part of the A.A. curriculum, students must complete two writing-intensive (WI) courses. The Hawaiian/ASL/foreign language requirement may be met through the completion of first level study of approved language foreign to the student (i.e., through 102) and/or through demonstrated proficiency at same level.

Course Substitutions

Substitutions to the A.A. degree requirements may be granted if identical substitutions are officially granted by a college at UH Mänoa. Please see an academic advisor for details.

Students majoring in Liberal Arts may substitute other courses for a specific requirement if the Dean of Instruction agrees that the substitution is required at the college to which the student intends to transfer. The student must complete and submit a course waiver form with supporting documentation.

University of Hawai'i Articulation

Effective Fall 1994, students who have earned an articulated Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree from a University of Hawai'i Community College shall be accepted as having fulfilled the general education core requirements at all other University of Hawai'i campuses. While an articulated A.A. degree satisfies general education core requirements, students must also complete all specialized lower-division, major, college and degree/graduation requirements. Additional campus-specific requirements, such as competency in a foreign language or writing-intensive courses may also be required. With planning, most, if not all, of these requirements may be incorporated into the Associate in Arts degree; if not, they are required in addition to the Associate in Arts degree.

Program Competencies: The competencies expected of the Associate in Arts degree student are not achieved in a single course or in the courses in a single department. The academic skill standards for critical thinking, information retrieval and technology, oral communication, quantitative reasoning, and written communication represent the minimum outcomes expected of students who have completed their general education experiences. Each course included in the general education curriculum should address at least one of these academic skill standards.

Upon successful completion of the A.A. degree in Liberal Arts, the student should be able to

in the area of Critical Thinking:

- Identify and state problems, issues, arguments, and questions contained in a body of information.
- Identify and analyze assumptions and underlying points of view relating to an issue or problem.
- Formulate research questions that require descriptive and explanatory analyses.
- Recognize and understand multiple modes of inquiry, including investigative methods based on observation and analysis.
- Evaluate a problem, distinguishing between relevant and irrelevant facts, opinions, assumptions, issues, values, and biases through the use of appropriate evidence.
- Apply problem-solving techniques and skills, including the rules of logic and logical sequence.
- Synthesize information from various sources, drawing appropriate conclusions.
- Communicate clearly and concisely the methods and results of logical reasoning.
- Reflect upon and evaluate their thought processes, value systems, and worldviews in comparison to those of others.

in the area of Information Retrieval and Technology:

- Use print and electronic information technology ethically and responsibly.
- Demonstrate knowledge of basic vocabulary, concepts, and operations of information retrieval and technology.
- Recognize, identify, and define an information need.
- Access and retrieve information through print and electronic media, evaluating the accuracy and authenticity of that information.
- · Create, manage, organize, and communicate information through electronic media.
- · Recognize changing technologies and make informed choices about their appropriateness and use.

in the area of Oral Communication:

- Identify and analyze the audience and purpose of any intended communication.
- Gather, evaluate, select, and organize information for the communication.
- Use language, techniques, and strategies appropriate to the audience and occasion.
- Speak clearly and confidently, using the voice, volume, tone, and articulation appropriate to the audience and occasion.
- Summarize, analyze, and evaluate oral communications and ask coherent questions as needed.
- Use competent oral expression to initiate and sustain discussions.

in the area of Quantitative Reasoning:

- Apply numeric, graphic, and symbolic skills and other forms of quantitative reasoning accurately and appropriately.
- Demonstrate mastery of mathematical concepts, skills, and applications, using technology when appropriate.
- · Communicate clearly and concisely the methods and results of quantitative problem solving.
- Formulate and test hypotheses using numerical experimentation.
- Define quantitative issues and problems, gather relevant information, analyze that information, and present results.
- Assess the validity of statistical conclusions.

in the area of Written Communication:

- · Use writing to discover and articulate ideas.
- Identify and analyze the audience and purpose for any intended communication.
- Choose language, style, and organization appropriate to particular purposes and audiences.
- Gather information and document sources appropriately
- Express a main idea as a thesis, hypothesis, or other appropriate statement.
- Develop a main idea clearly and concisely with appropriate content.
- Demonstrate mastery of the conventions of writing, including grammar, spelling, and mechanics.
- Demonstrate proficiency in revision and editing.
- Develop a personal voice in written communication.

in the area of Understanding Self and Community:

- Demonstrate an awareness of the relationship between the environment and their own fundamental physiological and psychological processes.
- Examine critically and appreciate the values and beliefs of their own culture and those of other cultures separated in time or space from their own.
- Communicate effectively and acknowledge opposing viewpoints.
- Use the study of a second language as a window to cultural understanding.
- Demonstrate an understanding of ethical, civic, and social issues relevant to Hawai'i's and the world's past, present, and future.

Any student who demonstrates that he or she has foreign language skills equal to the 102 level (or higher) may request a waiver of the foreign language credit requirement. A student with an approved waiver may substitute additional elective credits.

The issuance of an A.A. degree requires that the student must earn a grade point ratio (G.P.R.) of 2.0 or higher for all courses applicable toward the degree.

Please note: As part of the A.A. curriculum listed above, students must complete two writing-intensive (WI) courses. Students must also complete one Hawaiian, Asian and Pacific Issues (H) course.

Current H focus courses are BOT 105 and HWST 107 (fall 2002 – fall 2004), ENG 206, 257M (fall 2003 – summer 2005), HIST 284, 288 (fall 2003 – summer 2005).

The Hawaiian / Second language requirement may be met through the completion of first level study of approved language foreign to the student (i.e., through 102) and/or through demonstrated proficiency at the same level or higher. Any student who demonstrates that he or she has foreign language skills equal to the 102 level (or higher) may request a waiver of the foreign language credit requirement.

Academic Subject Certificate - Asian Studies (40 Semester Credits) expiration effective fall 2004

Program Description: An Academic Subject Certificate in Asian Studies will be a credential awarded to students who successfully complete a short-term structured series of courses in an interdisciplinary program. Students who earn a minimum grade point ratio of 2.0 in two years of an Asian language, and maintain that GPR while completing another 24 credits of related academic coursework, will be eligible for this certificate.

Program Competencies: A student who successfully completes this series of courses and earns an Academic Subject Certificate in Asian Studies will be able to:

- · Develop an appreciation and awareness of Asia.
- Develop an understanding of the environments and experiences of Asian peoples.
- · Analyze events and conditions in contemporary Asia and options for the twenty first century.
- Demonstrate an understanding of political, social, cultural, economic and other contributions of Asian civilization.
- Show an appreciation for the people of Asia by having attempted to view the hopes, aspirations and perceptions of the world through Asian eyes.
- Consider works of Asian art as reflections of the Asian cultural milieu and be able to compare that milieu with the student's own.
- Recognize major themes from all the Asian arts (fine arts, literature, drama, architecture, etc.) and explore their implications and identify their basic values and assumptions.
- Know the characteristics of the major schools of Asian philosophy, their development and occasional influence on each other, and appreciate the contrasts between Asian and Western thought.
- Demonstrate a familiarity with the geography of Asia and its interrelationship with the rest of the globe.
- Analyze contemporary issues and views of Asian peoples reflected in the mass media and other sources.
- Demonstrate an understanding of Asian cultural traditions, including their value systems, institutions, aesthetic expressions and their contemporary relevance.

SPECIFIC ACTION REQUESTED:

It is requested to approve changes in the Associate in Arts (A.A.) Degree at Kap'iolani Community College (KCC).

RECOMMENDED EFFECTIVE DATE:

Fall 2004.

ADDITIONAL COST:

None.

PURPOSE:

Kapi 'olani's Curriculum Committee and the Faculty Senate are proposing changes to the A.A. degree in order to facilitate the transfer of KCC students to the University of Hawai'i at Manoa (UHM) and to bring KCC's A.A. degree into closer alignment with the UHM General Education requirements adopted in 2001.

BACKGROUND:

The changes to KCC's A.A. degree have been proposed in response to new General Education requirements implemented by UHM in Fall 2001. The new UHM requirements were approved by the Board of Regents in July 2001.

KCC is proposing the following changes to its A.A. degree:

- (1) Accepting the UHM hallmarks as criteria for determining appropriate courses in the various categories
- (2) Renaming the categories to align with UHM's: Foundations (Written Communication, Symbolic Reasoning, Global and Multicultural Perspectives) and Diversification (Arts, Humanities, and Literatures; Natural Sciences; Social Sciences)

- (3) Broadening the range of classes that can meet the various area requirements, in keeping with UHM's hallmarks
- (4) Reducing the number of required credits in the three Diversification categories from 28 to 19 (one fewer course in each diversification category) to match UHM's Diversification requirements and to give students more freedom to explore areas of interest and potential majors while broadening their knowledge in a two-year Liberal Arts degree program.

(5) Adding a focus requirement for one course in Hawaiian, Asian and Pacific Issues.

The A.A. degree at KCC continues to meet requirements for the degree outlined in E5.209, including (1) at least 60 credits of baccalaureate-level courses numbered 100 and above; (2) a cumulative grade point ratio of 2.0 or higher for all courses applicable to the A.A degree requirements; and (3) a course in Oral Communications. The A.A. degree also continues to require two Writing Intensive (WI) courses.

ACTION RECOMMENDED:

It is recommended that approval of the proposed changes in KCC's Associate in Arts degree, effective Fall 2004.

This letter seeks an endorsement by your respective Boards for the newly created Foundations Board at Kapi'olani Community College (KCC) as per decisions arrived in the multi-campus Foundations Board meeting on April 24, 2004. The Foundations Board is largely based on a model created recently by HCC that was endorsed by the UH Manoa Foundations Board and the General Education Committee in March and April of 2004. I have attached a copy of the letter from KCC's Faculty Senate announcing and describing the purpose and composition of KCC's Foundations Board for your review.

Both the KCC and HCC Senate leadership has been at the forefront of efforts to initiate and implement collaborative articulation processes in the University of Hawaii system. Indeed, KCC, HCC, and UH Manoa are the core campus members of the new trilateral partnership of Gen Ed articulation. As such, the purpose of the KCC Foundations Board is to review courses as well as enable our campus to engage in discussions and planning for an articulation process based on the WI model.

KCC's Faculty Senate created the Foundations Board on an urgent basis so that we could be an active member and to participate in discussions and decision-making as a core campus in the trilateral engagement. It must be underscored that KCC's Foundations Board will be nested in a larger articulation

structure at the campus. The Faculty Senate at KCC did not want to create an elaborate structure on short notice. The Senate expressed the need for greater deliberation and consultation with KCC faculty at large and other constituents for the creation of additional articulation Boards and the necessary delineation and clarifications of their roles, responsibilities and lines of communication. This is a priority task of the Senate in the Fall semester of 2004.

We look forward to this collaboration to develop a transparent and efficient structure for articulation of courses between the three campuses and work towards the creation of a WI model of articulation.
