Articulation Agreement
University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa and West Valley College
[2022 – 2027]

We, the undersigned representatives of the public institutions of the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa (UHM) College of Social Sciences and West Valley College (WVC), adopt the following agreement. This voluntary commitment affirms the spirit of cooperation between UHM and WVC in matters related to transfer and articulation in an effort to increase opportunities for students to be successful throughout their educational careers.

WVC is an Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges Western Association of Schools and Colleges (ACCJC-WASC) accredited institution. A student who completes an Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) that is listed in ANNEX A of this agreement and whose program of study has met WVC’s graduation requirements for an ADT, will be guaranteed acceptance with junior standing and will have satisfied the General Education requirements, premised on the understanding that:

1. Upon evaluation of the student’s records, the College of Social Sciences may require the student to take up to 9 credits to fulfill UHM’s General Education requirements;
2. The student is responsible for fulfilling the Special Graduation requirements in Hawaiian or Second Language Studies and Focus;
3. A student who fulfills a certified completion of a University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa General Education (UHM GE) pattern will also be deemed to have met UH Mānoa Core General Education Requirements, including Foundation requirements; and
4. Student must complete 60 transferable credits from a regionally accredited institution(s).

Further, a student who has completed the ADT in a specific UHM major will be guaranteed a transfer pathway to the major as specified in ANNEX A. It is understood that ANNEX A may be updated upon agreement by the deans of each participating program. Additional programs may be added to this agreement by completing a rider signed by UHM Provost and all participating deans.

UHM General Education (ANNEX B) involves a modern, flexible, diverse, multicultural, and multi-disciplinary curriculum supported by excellent teachers, classrooms, and information technology. UHM’s unique global distinction is found in its Hawaiian, Asian and Pacific orientation. The academic program structure and research enterprise take special advantage of Hawai‘i’s unique geographic location, physical and biological environment, and cultural setting.

The following distribution of courses corresponds to the General Education Core requirements at UHM. *NOTE: Hawaiian or Second Language and Focus courses (Written, Oral, Ethics, and Hawaiian) comprise the Special Graduation requirements portion of the General Education requirements, and are not included in this agreement. Also, upon evaluation of the student's records, the College of Social Sciences may require the student to take up to 9 credits to fulfill UHM's General Education requirements.*

Points of Clarification

1. This agreement applies only to students with an ADT from WVC.
2. Transfer students accepted for admission at UHM with an Associate Degree for Transfer from WVC will be guaranteed admission on their ADT credits, and will be given junior standing premised on the understanding that:
 - a. UHM College of Social Science has the right to determine admissions standards to the various majors offered by the College.
 - b. Student must have a cumulative transfer GPA of a 2.5 or better.
 - c. Student must complete 60 transferable credits from a regionally accredited institution(s).
3. Students must fulfill the Focus Requirements (5 written, 1 oral, 1 ethics, and 1 Hawaiian) and Hawaiian/Second Language for completion of the degree as directed by the College of Social Sciences at UHM. UHM prorates the Focus courses required for graduation depending on the number of transfer credits evaluated. Students should meet with an ACCESS Advisor to identify the proration.
4. UHM retains the right to define the requirements of a baccalaureate degree. Additional courses not in the Transfer Guide, may be required.
5. Other associate degrees and certificates may be awarded for programs with requirements that differ from the baccalaureate-oriented sequences described in this agreement. Students in such programs are considered outside the terms of this agreement.
6. Students who receive credit for AP Exam Scores (3, 4, or 5) or IB Scores should submit results directly to the Office of Admissions for review. See for details: <https://manoa.hawaii.edu/admissions/pdf/AP.pdf>

7. A transfer student may be required to take freshman or sophomore courses to meet particular requirements or course prerequisites of a given major.
8. For WVC students that are non-native English speakers, additional classes from TOEFL and/or ELI may be required for successful completion of the baccalaureate degree. Completion of ENG 100 equivalent with a "D" or better will waive TOEFL requirement. A total of 60 transferable credits from West Valley College will exempt student from the ELI requirement.
9. For WVC students who are non-citizens, I-20's must be issued for transfer to UHM.
10. The spirit of this agreement indicates that WVC transfer students are to be judged academically in the same way as all other transfer students at UHM.

11. Both parties will review this agreement every five years to ensure that the General Education requirements continue to be met, and the transferability of credits remains current.
12. Upon evaluation of the student's records, the College of Social Sciences may require the student to take up to 9 credits to fulfill UHM's General Education requirements.
13. Students who are not pursuing an ADT will be given General Education credit for any articulated General Education course per the UHM and WVC Transfer Guide (Annex A), and will not be guaranteed junior standing.
14. Students who transfer to another program outside of the UHM College of Social Sciences will need to meet the specific requirements of that program and are not subject to the terms of this articulation agreement.
15. Students with residency from the following states may be eligible to participate in the Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) tuition program offered at 150 percent of UHM resident tuition: Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas Islands. Nursing and Dental Hygiene majors are not eligible for WUE.

I. Foundation Requirement: 12 credit hours or units

The Foundations requirements are intended to give students' skills and perspectives that are fundamental to undertaking higher education. Students complete the Foundations requirements during their first year at UH Mānoa. Courses taken to fulfill the Foundations requirements may not be used to fulfill Diversification or Focus requirements.

I.A. Written Communication (FW): 3 credit hours or units

Written Communication courses introduce students to the rhetorical, conceptual, and stylistic demands of writing at the college level; courses give instruction in composing processes, search strategies, and composing from sources. Courses also provide students with experiences in the library and on the internet and enhance their skills in accessing and using various types of primary and secondary materials.

III. The Hawaiian or Second Language (HSL):

In addition to improving written and oral communication and reasoning skills, proficiency in Hawaiian or a second language (HSL) is an integral part of the university's mission to "prepare students to function effectively in a global society," to "preserve and promulgate Hawaiian, Asian, and Pacific language, history, and culture and [to] provide students an education experience with an international dimension" (The University of Hawai'i Strategic Plan 1996-2001: "Goals," sec. 111, C: p. 5; "Action Strategies," sec. V, 2; p. 9).

The Hawaiian or Second Language (HSL) requirement varies by UHM college/school. Half require that students demonstrate competence at the 202 (or equivalent) level in Hawaiian or a second language by doing one of the following:

- a. Completing a four-semester sequence (usually 101, 102, 201, and 202) in a single language.
- b. Demonstrating competence by taking a UHM exam if one is offered. Check with the language department in question.
- c. Receiving a language-requirement waiver by demonstrating 202-level second language competency. For example, waivers may be given to students who are native speakers of a language other than English. Contact an academic advisor in your college for further information.

*Only the Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas Islands (CNMI) can participate in WUE.

Eligibility

The determination of eligibility will be based upon the information that you provide on the online application. Award of the WUE tuition status will be included on your acceptance letter. If your acceptance letter reflects the non-resident tuition status and you feel that you are eligible for the WUE tuition status, please contact the Office of Admissions.

Please note that the following majors/status' are not eligible for the WUE:

- Nursing** and Dental Hygiene majors
- Those who already have received a bachelor's degree
- Unclassified status
- Students participating in A Semester In Hawai'i (ASH) exchange program

**Pre-Nursing students are eligible for the WUE until entry into the Nursing program.

Terms/Conditions

- By participating in the WUE tuition program, tuition is reduced on the basis of residency of a region listed above.
- Because tuition is reduced on the basis of residency of a region listed above, the process of establishing Hawai'i residency for tuition purposes cannot happen until after terminating participation in the WUE for a period of one year (AND meeting the necessary requirements to be eligible for resident tuition status during that one year). For more information on establishing Hawai'i residency for tuition purposes, contact the Office of Admissions.

II. Eligibility for Resident Tuition

State of Hawai'i law recognizes several categories of nonresident students who are allowed to pay resident tuition:

- United States military personnel, their spouses, and their authorized dependents (up to age 23) during the period the military personnel is stationed in Hawai'i on active duty
- Members of the Hawai'i National Guard or Hawai'i-based Reserve who are under contract in Hawai'i
- Certain employees of the UH
- East-West Center student grantees pursuing baccalaureate or advanced degrees at the UH
- Native Hawaiians, descendants of the aboriginal peoples who inhabited the Hawaiian Islands and exercised sovereignty in the Hawaiian Islands in 1778

In addition, the UH allows citizens of certain Pacific islands that do not have baccalaureate-granting public institutions to pay 150 percent of the resident tuition:
