Curriculum changes which reflect NH Focus (i..e increase Hawaiian Studies courses, Hawaiian language courses, increase number of sections, etc.)

- 1. Hawaiian Language Courses: Beginning and Intermediate levels are offered HAW 101, HAW 102, HAW 201, and HAW 202 at Leeward CC.
- 2. Hawaiian Language Academic Subject Certificate: in development
- 3. Hawaiian Language classes: Leeward CC, Wai'anae is working to increase community access to Hawaiian Language classes by offering classes at different sites on the Wai'anae coast.
- 4. Hawaiian Studies Academic Subject Certificate (17 credits): provides a strong introduction to the culture, language and history of Hawai'i and the Native Hawaiian people
- 5. Associate of Arts in Hawaiian Studies (60 credits): designed to provide either the first two years of a baccalaureate program in Hawaiian Studies or to prepare students for study in other, broader fields of science, humanities, arts, and social sciences
- Community Food Security Academic Subject Certificate: added HWST 291 (Contemporary Hawaiian Issues) part of Kauhale program

Leadership opportunities for NH:

- Leadership opportunities not necessarily geared to NH specifically, but there were opportunities for NH faculty, staff, and students to apply for positions on:
 - Faculty Senate*
 - Campus Council (seat for Na 'Ewa Council Representative on CC)
 - Student Government
 - UH System leadership development programs such as Wo Learning Champions, President's Emerging Leaders Program, etc.

* NH faculty is serving for the 2nd academic year as Faculty Senate Chair (2014-2016)

 - Liko A'e Scholarship Program (2012 2015): "The Liko A'e Native Hawaiian Leadership Program is committed to serving Native Hawaiian students pursuing higher education by providing scholarships, mentoring services, internship opportunities and counseling support. Liko A'e provides guidance through the values
